SIR,—With feelings of the greatest astonishment I read in your paper of Saturday, the 18th, most malignant and impotent Advertisement. Mr. Ash, the evident object of which appears to be the just payment of his debts to his creditors, prevent the person appointed by the creditors for the composition,—and professing to have it gratuitously by his own son, whom, by a dexterous artifice, he calls his tenant.

The office of Sequestrator has literally been taken by the creditors, and the Bishop can vouch for the manner in which I discharged the office with And, surely, the many kind acts which I executed for Mr. Ash, in advancing him money, ought rather to be his gratitude than the foolish aspersion which he has thrown on my character. So far from troubling the parishioners of Crough during the time they paid me the Composition, that I defy any Advertiser to instance one case of distress made while I had the collection. It is a flagitious man in the sacred garb of a Clergyman, and to be on the brink of the grave, to stoop to what he knows and palpable falsehood in stating that I exacted a pound for collecting. For such sum was ever demanded by me. The Creditors, in the presence of the Bishop, agreed to pay the usual fees allowed to a Sequestrator, which is considerably under what he has received.
