On Monday night last, a party of the Clare Police landed at Loughill in search of a man named Reidy, who was charged, on oath, with being one of the party who attacked a house for arms, but did not succeed in arresting him. After the party had returned, Constable Lothorn, of the Limerick Constabulary, under Mr. Smith's orders, stationed at Loughill, from the description given by the Clare Police, made a fresh pursuit, and was so fortunate as to capture him, and Captain Radford kindly afforded his assistance in transmitting him to the County of Clare, where he was fully identified and committed for trial.

On Wednesday night, a valuable mare, the property of John Sheehan, was maliciously houghed and one of its legs broken on the lands of Ballada, parish of O'Brien's Bridge, County Clare.

Twenty-one bales of Tobacco were seized last night, when being conveyed on a car from Clonmel to Ennis. They were weighed in the Custom-House yard this morning, and then consigned to the King's store. Horse and car were included in the seizure. It appears the above is Tobacco of Irish growth, and a representation is to be forwarded to the Board of Customs on the subject.

Yesterday, a woman named Whelan, residing in Clare was convicted in the penalty of £10, for passing a receipt upon unstamped paper.

Yesterday the Mayor sent four persons to the treadmill in the city gaol for a week, having been caught in the act of robbing a garden.

At the Petit Sessions, this day, Anne Carmody, on charge of robbery, was remanded for further examination. Mary Phelan, for assaulting a Policeman, was fined 2s. 6d. or a week's imprisonment. John White and John McNamara were committed for assaulting a man who is not yet pronounced out of danger. Robert Bushe was convicted in a mitigated penalty of 30s. and costs, for selling spirits on the Sabbath.
