General Quarter Sessions and Special Sessions for taking Census.

County of Limerick, THE Special Sessions for taking to Wit. _ the Census, will be held at RATHK EALE, on FRIDAY, the 14th of October, at 10 o'Clock in the Morning, on which day all the Enumerators are required to attend there to

deliver in and verify their respective returns On the same day the General Quarter Sessions will be held at RATHKEALE, for the division of Rathkeale, and the Civil Business will be proceeded with in the following order:-1st The Processes from the Barony of Kenry; next, those from that part of Coshma which lies to the west of the Maigue; next, those from the Barony of Lower Connelloe; and lastly those from the Barony of Upper Connelloe. On WEDNESDAY the 19th, Ejectments will he heard in the Morning, and on the same day at 12 o'Clock the Grand Jury will be sworn, after which the Appeals will be heard and then the Freeholders registered; and lastly, the Crown business disposed of.

The attention of the Suitors from Upper and Lower Connelloe is particularly drawn to the change in the order in which those Baronies are placed, for the future it is intended to give them precedence of each other alternatel

The Process servers are desired to attend at RATHKEALE on Thursday, the 13th of October, at the Court House, (which will be open for the purpose) from Ten o'Clock in the Morning till Six in the Evening, to give out their Processes. All the Processes for Rathkeale must be entered with the Clerk of the Peace before the sitting of the Court on Friday, the 14th, and he will not be permitted to receive any Processes after that time; this regulation will be strictly adhered to

The Quarter Sessions for the Limerick Division will commence at LIMERICK, on SATURDAY, the 22d of October, at Teno'Clock in the Morning, on which day the Civil Business will begin and be proceeded with in the following order :- First, the Processes from the Barony of Costlea; secondly, those from Small County; thirdly, the Processes from those parts of Coshma and Upper Connelloe which lie to the East of the River Maigue; fourthly, the Processes from Clanwilliam; fifthly, those from Public Brien; sixthly, those from Ouncybeg; seventhly, those from Coonagh, and lastly the Processes from the Liberties of the City of Limerick. On Thursday, the 27th, in the Morning the Ejectments will be heard, and on the same Morning the Ejectments will be heard, and on the same day the Grand Jury will be sworn at 120 Clock, after which the Appeals will be disposed of, the Freeholders registered and the Crown business then disposed of.

The Assistant Barrister, with the concurrence of such of the Magistrates as he has had an opportunity of consulting thought it expedient to discontinue the practice of hearing the Crown business first at Limerick, as it has happened more than once that the pressure of business at Rathkeale has delayed the Assistant Barrister there an additional day, and thus he has been under the necessity of disappointing the Magistrates and Grand and Petty Jurors at Limerick.

The Process Servers are desired to attend at Limerick at the Court House (which will be open for that purpose) on FRIDAY, the 21st from the hour of ten in the morning to the hour of six in the afternoon in order to give out their Processes. All Processes for Limerick must be entered with the Clerk of the Peace before the sitting of the Court on SATURDAY, the 22d, and he will not be permitted to receive any Processes after that time; this regulation will be strictly adheared to.

For the convenience of the Suitors at Quarter Sessions, a paper will be exposed at the door of the Court House, containing the name of the Barony with the Civil business of which the Court shall be then occupied. All persons atwhich the Court shall be then occupied. All persons attending the Court on business are requested, upon hearing their names called, to answer by the word "here," and they will meet with every facility in going up to the table; by neglecting to answer in this manner, witnesses and others are often distracted by the crowd and sometimes even by the Police. It is also requested that when the names of the parties in a Process are called, the witnesses for those parties will not wait to hear their names called but come forward at

The Process Servers must be very particular in attending to their printed regulations, and also to the arrangements entered into by the Gentlemen who practice at the Sessions, otherwise they will be fined. The Police who shall be on duty in the Court houses are to preserve order and silence, and on no account to be rude or rough to the suitors, but to bring before the Assistant Barrister, all persons who misconduct themselves. The Sheriff and the Chief Constables on duty will be careful to have those directions implicitly

The Magistrates are particularly requested to return all Informations and Recognizances to the Clerk of the Peace, eight days at least; previous to the 14th of October next.
