

of ignominious death, pronounced the sentence of the Court, which was that they should be hanged on Saturday at the usual place of execution and to be anatomized. As soon as Lordship had ceased, the two male prisoners had, with full asseverations, declared they were innocent—the etched woman, more dreadfully impressed, perhaps with full convictions of her guilt, remained silent. The prisoners were then removed while they filled the house with lamentations. In a minute or two after the verdict was read, there was dreadful screaming in the streets by the friends of these unhappy creatures—the mother of one of them made attempt to drown herself.

Among the inhabitants of Clonmel there is very little compassion for these culprits, as they were persons of the very worst character.

This day the Judge and Counsellor Ronayne were robbed in Court—the former of his handkerchief, the latter of his watch.

The trial of Robert Gunston, Pat. Brien, Pat. Gleeson, and James Morrissy, for the murder of Pat. Mura, was postponed to next assizes.

John Todd, Michael Magrath and Thomas Ryan, had sentence of death recorded, for compelling men named Callaghan, to leave their work.

William Stapleton was acquitted of the murder of Dorothea Stapleton, his wife.

Michael Keating was sentenced to 7 years' transportation, for stealing five pigs.

Michael Kennedy, William Delany, Thomas Hassett and James Moylan, were acquitted of injuring the habitation of Thomas Mealy, and endeavouring to compel him to quit.

The Clonmel assizes ended on Saturday.

At Cork Assizes, Patrick Hagarty and John Ahern were convicted of pig-stealing—7 years transportation. Michael Barry and Henry Sheehan, convicted of the manslaughter of John Breen, of Buttevant; Daniel Linihan and John Carroll, manslaughter of Daniel Murphy, Macroom; Andrew Coxen and Catherine Wilson, for breaking into the house of Charles Lewett, Esq. of Bandon—to be transported for life. Mary McMahon, for robbing Mr. Allen, near Charleville—to be transported for 7 years. Patrick and John Burns, of Ballygibbon, for cutting off the ears of a horse belonging to Daniel Sullivan, of the County Kerry, who went to bring potatoes for his family, who were starving—to be transported for life.

John Dwyer, a child of nine years old, was sentenced at Cork to be transported for seven years, for stealing a watch from Michael Colbert, of Fermoy.

The Cork Assizes terminated yesterday.

The Grand Jury of the County Cork have requested the Magistrates not in future to hire horses and cars in conveying prisoners from the country to gaol—the expense being heretofore enormous.

A grand dinner was given by the Mayor of Cork, at the Mansion-House, on Thursday, to the Judges, the Grand Jurors, and several distinguished characters.

A meeting was held yesterday evening at the Linnen-Hall for the purpose of considering the expediency of establishing a Temperance Society in Limerick. It was attended by a number of Gentlemen, Mechanics, and Labourers—the Rev. J. Brahan, of St. Mary's Parish, in the Chair.

Dr. Harvey, honorary secretary of the Hibernian Temperance Society in Dublin, addressed the Meeting at considerable length, and gave a voluminous and interesting detail of the rise, progress, and extraordinary success of these institutions, both in America, where they were first established, and also in such parts of this country where they have been recently introduced. He read copious testimonies from numerous Physicians of eminence, proving that a very great proportion of the diseases with which the poor are afflicted, can be traced to the use of ardent spirits; and the experience of ages shews that poverty and crime come from the same evil source. He then contrasted the picture, by viewing the happy effects of abstaining from the use of this noxious liquor, whereby industrious, frugal, and provident habits are induced, bringing health, peace and comforts to the poor man's fire-side, increasing the amount of his positive happiness in this world, and laying the best foundation of his hopes in the world to come.

Dr. Harvey concluded a long and interesting address, by expressing his confident expectations, that the good work which had begun and prospered elsewhere, would be undertaken in this City; and hoped that no time might be lost in establishing a Temperance Society here.

A Committee was then appointed for the purpose of disseminating information on the subject, with a view to the immediate formation of such a society; the Committee to be an open one, and to meet at 7 o'clock on Monday evening, at the Linnen-Hall.

James J. Fisher, Esq. offered his services as Secretary. Thanks were then voted to Doctor Harvey and the Chairman, and the meeting separated.
