... they are free to acknowledge they are "the best boatmen in the world," but not tried—and the Castle-Connell men and their friends having some small opinion of their own prowess in boat racing and nautical powers, so far at least as regards what can be done in the river Shannon—do confess they are induced to afford the Strand men an opportunity of proving to the public they are really what the newspaper has so kindly dubbed them "the first boatmen in the world." But the Castle-Connell men say, as soldiers do in war, the more danger the more honor, and very fairly on this occasion are to have the honor of proving that the same shall not altogether be on the side of the Strand men of Limerick; the boatmen of Castle-Connell do therefore challenge the Strand men of Limerick, to run their 'Lady of the Lake' on any given day this week, against 'Honest Tom Steele', for any sum from £5 to £20—each boat to bear a flag, and the race to be conducted by Gentlemen Stewards.

Mr. Judge, Chief Constable of Police, has been honorably acquitted by the Magistrates assembled at Birr, of any participation in the late election for the King's County. Sir John Harvey, Inspector of the Leinster district, attended the investigation. The charge was preferred by Lord Rossmore.

John Kennedy, a young man, brass founder by trade, was drowned on Sunday morning, while bathing in the Abbey river, near Park bridge. He was an excellent swimmer, but it is thought plunged into the water not in a perfect state of sobriety, and thus perished in view of several persons, who could not imagine he was drowning. His body was found soon after.

Thomas Burke, a boy of ten years fell out of a turf lighter between Castle-Connell and O'Brien's-bridge, on Sunday last, and was drowned. James Bennett, Esq. held an inquest on the body. Verdict, accidental death.

The Rev. Richard Samuel Clifford, A. B. Curate of Maheraculmoy, has been promoted by his Grace the Archbishop of Tuam to the perpetual cure of Drumshanbee, in that Archdiocese.

The Lord Chancellor has been pleased to appoint Robert Phayre, jun. Esq. to the Commission of the Peace for the County Wexford.

The great fair of Spancel-hill was held on Saturday, but there was a great falling off with respect to the quantity and condition of black cattle; the number offered for sale was small, and of an inferior description; a few lots of half fat cattle sold from £6 to £7, and one lot of ten brought at £5; there were no prime fat cattle in the fair; as for fat Sheep they were not to be had; the number of Horses offered for sale was small, and of an inferior description.

The fair of Dromin was held on Thursday; the shew of black cattle was poor; two lots of fat cows sold at £10, and several smaller lots brought £9; fat Sheep were much looked for, but they were not to be had.

The Embankment Bill, a meeting concerning which is advertised in our paper of this day, seems to give very considerable powers to the Company about to be created under it, and to militate in no slight degree against the interests of Water Mill Proprietors, hitherto protected by former Acts of the Legislature. We particularly direct attention to page 59 of the Bill, containing a direct attack on all Mill Weirs, Water Courses, &c. leaving the Proprietors a law suit with irresponsible persons, for injury sustained by the destruction of their property.

The Embankment Bill, page 59, contains the following clause, which we give for the information of those concerned—And be it further enacted, that the said Company of Undertakers or Trustees respectively shall, and they are hereby authorized and empowered, from time to time and at all times hereafter, when they shall think the same advisable, to alter or remove the Hatches of any Mills, or any Weirs, erected upon the streams of water, or any Weirs or impediments whatsoever, and the Water Courses to and from such Mills or any other old Water Courses, which now or hereafter shall be in the district, and under the jurisdiction of the said Company or Trustees, making proper satisfaction and compensation for all such damage or injury to the Proprietors or other Persons interested in such Mills, Weirs, or Water Courses, by and out of the monies to be raised and applied in pursuance of this Act, and in case the said Com-
