

The Embankment Bill, a meeting concerning which is advertised in our paper of this day, seems to give very considerable powers to the Company about to be created under it, and to militate in no slight degree against the interests of Water Mill Proprietors, hitherto protected by former Acts of the Legislature. We particularly direct attention to page 59 of the Bill, containing a direct attack on all Mill Weirs, Water Courses, &c. leaving the Proprietors a law suit with irresponsible persons, for injury sustained by the destruction of their property.

The Embankment Bill, page 50, contains the following clause, which we give for the information of those concerned—“And be it further enacted, that the said Company of Undertakers or Trustees respectively shall, and they are hereby authorized and empowered, from time to time and at all times hereafter, when they shall think the same advisable, to alter or remove the Hatches of any Mills, or any Weirs, erected upon the streams of water, or any Weirs or impediments whatsoever, and the Water Courses to and from such Mills or any other old Water Courses, which now or hereafter shall be in the district, and under the jurisdiction of the said Company or Trustees, making proper satisfaction and compensation for all such damage or injury to the Proprietors or other Persons interested in such Mills, Weirs, or Water Courses, by and out of the monies to be raised and levied by virtue of this Act: and in case the said Company or Trustees, and the said Proprietors, and other persons, cannot agree about the quantum of such satisfaction or compensation, then and in such case the same shall be ascertained and settled in like manner as the value of land or ground used or taken by the said Company of Undertakers by virtue of this Act, and any damage or injury which may be done under any of the powers of this Act, are hereinbefore directed to be settled and ascertained.”

NOTICE TO MARINERS.

THE COMMISSIONERS OF THE NORTHERN LIGHTHOUSES hereby give Notice, that a Lighthouse has been erected upon **DUNNETHEAD**, in the County of Caithness, the Light of which will be exhibited on Saturday the first of October, 1831, and will thereafter continue to be lighted every night from the going away of daylight in the evening, till the return of daylight in the morning.

The following is a Specification of the position of the Lighthouse, and the appearance of the Light, by Mr. Stevenson, Engineer to the Commissioners.

DUNNETHEAD LIGHTHOUSE is situated on the Northern extremity of the mainland of Scotland, in North Latitude 58° 42', and West Longitude 3° 29'.

The Lighthouse by COMPASS bears from the North end of the Island of Stromo in Pentland Frith, W. by N. distant 7½ miles; from Hoyhead leading to Hoy Sound, S.S.W. distant 13 miles; from the Stack and Skerry, S. by E. ½ E. distant 31 miles, and from Cape Wrath in Sutherlandshire, E. by S. ½ S. distant 42 miles. In reference to these bearings, the Light will be visible to the Mariner in a Northerly direction from S.E. ½ E. to W.

This Light will be known to Mariners as a **STATIONARY LIGHT**, from Oil with reflectors; and being elevated 346 feet above the medium level of the Sea, it will be seen like a star of the first magnitude, at the distance of from 7 to 8 leagues, and at intermediate distances according to the state of the weather.
