

In discussing the Irish estimates on Monday evening in the House of Commons, Mr. O'Connell is reported to have said "that the Mayor of Limerick was induced to billet as many soldiers on the Papists, and as few on the Protestants, as he could in the exercise of his Magisterial discretion."—We beg to inform the Learned Member that it does not belong to the duties, nor has it been the practice of the Mayor of Limerick, whoever may fill that distinguished office, to billet soldiers at any time "on Papists or Protestants", to use the words of Mr. O'Connell, or any other class of persons.—It would be, therefore, idle to offer a syllable in contradiction to the absurdity of this ill-natured remark.

The charge of billeting soldiers invariably devolves on the High Constable of this City, and we have never heard a complaint against that officer, of any distinction between Protestant or Roman Catholic.

Yesterday, in the middle of the day, two men attired in women's apparel, went on the lands of Stonehall, in the Barony of Bunratty, the property of Arthur Gloster, Esq. fired shots and drove off the persons engaged in mowing.

On the night of Monday last, the house of Owen Murphy, residing on the lands of Ballysheean, (three miles from Cashel,) was maliciously set on fire and totally consumed, together with every article of furniture, by some person or persons unknown. No reason can be assigned for this outrage.

The Police, at New-Ian, took down on Wednesday morning, a notice which they found posted on James Galligan's gate, ordering a man named John Callaghan to quit Galligan's service, otherwise they would murder him. Callaghan is from the County Limerick, and has only been in Galligan's employment about a month.

On Tuesday night about nine o'clock, a young man named Pearce was attacked by five fellows in Rutland-street, Cork, and robbed of his Watch and Seals.

The houses of two herdsmen were visited a few nights ago by the Terry Alts near Gort, who ordered them to give up their care on pain of death.

Thursday night, several fowl were stolen from an out-house of Mr. Clarke, at Raheen, near this City.

A man was nearly killed in a hurling match near Tulla, on Sunday last.

The Lord Lieutenant has offered a reward of £200 for the murderers of Thomas Gregory, Esq. of Carlow; and £100 for the murderers of Mr. O'Shaughnessy, Tithe Surveyor, in Tipperary.

Mary McMahon, of Castle-street, a woman about forty-five years, the wife of a pensioner, and mother of two children, flung herself into the river at Thomond-bridge, on Thursday morning, and was drowned. The Mayor held an inquest on the body, which was taken up in a few minutes after. Verdict—Insanity.

A grown boy of the name of Conway fell out of a fishing boat at the North-Strand, this morning, and was drowned.

The following persons were arrested by the City Police on Thursday evening—Mary Donovan, William McGrath, and Sally McGrath, on whom the sum of £16 9s. and a silver watch, capped and jewelled, were found. The conduct of the Serjeant-Major and the Police on this and every case where their assistance is required is praise-worthy.

At Tralee Petit Sessions on Monday, an English guager prosecuted a publican for having "Licensed Spirit Shop" over his door, he not having taken out license. The evidence however proved the amount of the license was paid, and the usual bonds executed. The Tralee Paper observes, "more Revenue prosecutions have been carried on, but without success, by ignorant Englishmen, apparently taken from the lowest class of society, even in the short period of three months, than have occurred for several years previously in this district."

Large quantities of paper have been lately seized from stationers in Tralee by English Excise Officers, for alleged breach of the Revenue laws.

Several light weights were seized yesterday by the Mayor.

Lieut. Davis, R. N. late Commander of his Majesty's vessel Alban, at Woolwich, was seized with a violent attack of cholera on Thursday, whilst on duty at the Dock-yard. He was the same day removed to the Marine Hospital, where he expired on Saturday evening; every advantage that admirable establishment affords having proved unavailing. He has left a widow to deplore his untimely loss.

William M. Foster, of Lincoln's Inn, Esq. Attorney, his wife Jane, and their footman, perished in the wreck of the Rathsay Castle steamer, at Beaumaris. The above Gentleman was brother of Captain Foster, Royal Horse Artillery, formerly quartered in this City.
