

Limerick, Mr. Edwards from Plymouth, and some person from Portsmouth. A tender was put in on the part of Sir Charles Flower. There was more delay than usual before it was known who was the successful bidder; but Mr. Callaghan being at length called in, all suspense was over.—The prices are—For Beef, 4,000 tierces, £5 8s. 6d.—For Pork, 12,000 ditto, £6 3s.—near £6 a tierce in the round, which is about £1 a tierce over the price at which it was taken last year.

This year's contract will be made up in Cork and Limerick. The Government Contractor last year was Benjamin Shaw, Esq. of London—Price, Beef £4 7s. 4d. per tierce; Pork £4 19s. 4d. per tierce.

The apprehensions we ventured to express of the yet unsettled state of Clare, and the premature withdrawal of troops from that County have been confirmed by the occurrences of the last few days. Yesterday another outrage was committed. About four o'clock in the evening, two Terry Alts, disguised in female attire, one wearing a bonnet, and the other a muslin cap, pursued a man who was obnoxious to them, into the house of a publican named Edmond Ryan, at Cratloe-Cross, on the Mail-Coach road near this City.—Those fellows were armed with a case of pistols each, and would have murdered the unfortunate refugee, but for the interposition of Ryan, who after earnestly remonstrating with both the insurgents, at length refused to deliver him up. They were so dissatisfied with this as to threaten Ryan himself, and forced him to surrender his gun, with which they departed, taking the road to Sixmile-Bridge, and apparently careless of all observation. Carmody, the intended victim of those ruffians, was a friend of Mr. Donohue's herd (Molony) in the same neighbourhood, whose brutal murder was recorded in our columns.

Same party attempted to stop an Officer in regimentals, travelling on horseback; but observing their intent he effected his escape by galloping off.

A notice was also served upon a person in the neighbourhood, who had taken some ground and paid a heavy fine, to quit the farm, which he complied with, and left it yesterday.

Yesterday evening, at 5 o'clock, a party of Terry Alts, dressed in female apparel, all armed, entered the hay-yard of Mr. Thomas Donohue, of Rynanah, county Clare, drove away his workmen, and swore his herdsmen not to take care of the place.

Two men of the names of Connellan and Moriarty, were apprehended on Monday night, by the Police from Ennis, charged with several robberies in the parish of Kilmamona.

One of the persons charged with the murder of Serjeant Robinson, of the 5th Foot, was brought in to Ennis on Tuesday by the Ballinacally police.

Same day three men from the neighbourhood of Corofin, charged with several offences, were also brought to gaol; they were apprehended the night before by R. G. Brew, Esq.

An important notice from the Mayor, and Magistrates of this City, on the very reprehensible practise of stone throwing, appears in our columns. The evil had in fact attained such a climax, that a notification of this kind was absolutely necessary, to terrify the numerous miscreants who indulge in this vicious amusement.

The High Sheriff of Galway has received his Excellency the Lord Lieutenant's order for the removal of Luke Dooly, Martin Burke, John Commons, John Kelly, Patrick Lanty Laurence Conry, Martin Connolly, John Dermody, Nicholas Coleman, Andrew Egan, Bernard Lyons, Thomas Kelly, John Ryan and Patrick Ward, to be removed from the gaol on Wednesday to the hulk Surprise at Cove, for transportation. The latter three men were convicted at the Special Commission in June last, and the others at the last Assizes.

Seven convicts from the town of Galway gaol accompany the County convicts—making a total of 21.

The above convicts arrived here yesterday, on three cars, escorted by Lieutenant Giffard's detachment of the 5th, and proceeded under the same guard this morning on the road to Cork.

The Lord Lieutenant has offered a reward of £100 for the persons who attempted to assassinate Captain Bell, of Bellmount, near Dungannon, last month.

Police Serjeant Doig has been dismissed the Mayo Constabulary force, for improper conduct.

Our gallant and distinguished fellow-citizen, Major-Gen. Sir Hugh Gough, late Colonel of the 22d Regiment, is promoted to the rank of Knight Commander of the Most Honorable Military Order of the Bath.

The Bohemian Brothers are giving concerts in Waterford. Paganini leaves Dublin for Cork on Sunday. He gives his farewell concert on Saturday, when he will play St. Patrick's Day on the 4th string.

On Saturday, twenty of the men employed in the Naval Department at Haulbowline were discharged, so that not a remnant of the Naval Arsenal for which Cove was heretofore distinguished now remains. The persons discharged included several watchmen and labourers, some of whom had been employed for upwards of twenty years, and who have now, at an advanced period of life, with heavy families, been thrown upon the world without any provision whatsoever.

Thursday, the Committee for superintending the sale of the Corporation Tolls, in Cork, assembled in the Court-House, and Mr. Cashman was declared the lessee of the Tolls, Dues, and Customs of the North Meat Market, the North Milk Market, the North Potatoe Market, the South Meat Market, the South Potatoe Market, the Bridewell Market, and the Blackpool Market, for the ensuing year, at a sum of £1183.
