the Census, will be held at RATHK EALE, on FRIDAY, the
14th of October, at 10 o'Clock in the Morning, on which

day all the Enumerators are required to attend there to deliver in and verify their respective returns.

On the same day the General Quarter Sessions will be

held at RATHKEALE, for the division of Rathkeale, and the Civil Business will be proceeded with in the following order:-Ist. The Processes from the Barony of Kenry; next, those from that part of Coshma which lies to the west next, those from that part of Coshna which lies to the west of the Maigne; next, those from the Barony of Lower Connelloe; and lastly those from the Barony of Upper Connelloe. On WEDNESDAY the 19th, Ejectments will be heard in the Morning, and on the same day at 12 o'Clock the Grand Jury will be sworn, after which the Appeals will be heard and then the Freeholders registered; and lastly, the Crown business disposed of. The attention of the Suitors from Upper and Lower
