SIR EDW. CODRINGTON AT COVE.
 In the afternoon, the gallant Admiral, with his fleet of 150 ships, sailed off the harbour, and pilots having been engaged, the ships were all within the harbour by half-past 4 o'clock, the Caledonia and Britannia, 120 guns each, the Revenge and Revenge, 71 guns each; Barham, 64; Tweed, 20; Victor, 15; Recruit, 10; Cybilla, 10; Royalist, 10; and Viper schooner. The presence of such a number of ships of war excited considerable interest. Steam boats of all craft, filled with company, proceeded to the Cove, the spectators were indeed highly pleased to see the appearance of a fleet of such magnitude which was difficult to describe. At one o'clock, signal was given to sail, and the view of hundreds of blue sails, performing this duty, was a spectacle never to be forgotten. Sir Edward Codrington proceeded for on Monday morning. The Mayor and Sheriff's party lay to the Caledonia, and they will be entertained on Wednesday; the Admiral returns on Wednesday with the Mayor, at the Mansion-House, and will depart off Cork Harbour at an early hour on Saturday. In consequence of the hazy weather and rain, the fleet did not come on, and continued for several hours, firing signal guns for pilots. The thunder was distinctly heard at Cove.

The Admiral, with a select and fashionable company, sailed on Monday, with the signal given, and in a twinkling, the fleet was filled with British tars. The sight was truly sublime in the extreme. As it was evidently a gay company in the Steamer, it was warmed with loud and hearty cheers by the gentle-waving their handkerchiefs. As the Steamer-veeage, the band struck up *St. Patrick's Day*, and other martial and national airs, which were received with loud cheers.

It is almost impossible to describe the formidable appearance of the Caledonia and Britannia—they are tremendous vessels, and were to the enemy that came within the range of their guns. Numbers went on board, and the attention and urbanity of the officers were the subject of general praise. On Monday Sir Edward Codrington inspected Haulbowline, where he was met by some of the leading inhabitants, who resolved to point out the great advantages of having an Admiral's Station, and the incalculable benefit that would result to public and private property by the establishment of an Arsenal. In the evening he arrived at the City of Cork, accompanied by two of his sons and several officers. Some officers have got leave of absence, and will be absent in this and the adjoining Counties, but will be on board. In fact Sir Edward only remains, and as soon as they reach him he will be on board. Should they, however, not arrive by Thursday, it is expected that he will continue his cruise in the City.

A list of the City will be presented to the gallant Admiral, and a valuable freight—7 Officers belonging to Sir E. Codrington's fleet, will be sent to the Lakes.
