Every body echoes the momentous question: "What will the Lords do?" Who are the number, rank, and degree? We answer by publishing a roll of their titles. The House of Lords is composed of all the five orders of English Nobility:—Archbishops, Bishops, Barons, Knights, and Knights of the Bath; of 16 Representative Peers from England; of 16 Representative Peers from Ireland; two English Bishops; and four Representative Peers from Scotland. The gross number appears as follows:—Archbishops 2, Bishops 28, Marquises 26, Earls 129, Viscounts 143, Representative Peers of Scotland 16, English Archbishops and Bishops 34, Representative Bishops, 4—Total of the House of Lords 400. In this mixed list there are a few minors, a few Peers incapacitated by age and infirmity, and who will not be able to attend; but in the present Peers and proxies we have nearly 400 of the British and Irish Nobility on the Reform Bill.

On Monday, immediately after the adjournment of the House of Commons, the Duke of Devonshire, drove off to dine with the Earl of Essex, and to gallop to Windsor Castle, to remain with their Majesties, until Monday.

Mr. T. Spring Rice arrived in town yesterday.

The Princess Louise bathed in the sea on Monday, having been actually driven from Weymouth, where they had intended to bathe, by the impertinent curiosity of a crowd of well-to-do people, who pressed in the most rude manner on the Royal Party.

It is rumoured not only that Presentations at the House of Commons will be more narrowly scrutinized than they have been, but that there are persons of more than ordinary rank, though they have heretofore escaped the notice of the House, who are likely to be re-admitted to the Royal circle. It is also rumoured that the Bishops of Norwich, Worcester, Bath and Wells, will certainly be admitted to the Reform Bill, as well as the Archbishop of York. The names of the Bishops of London and Winchester are uncertain.

Mr. G. C. Lewis last night gave notice of the following resolution:—"Return of the names of every benefice in several dioceses of Ireland, whether they are benefices, particularising the length of the benefice, whether in holy orders, with the amount of the stipend; also the amount each pays to a curate or vicar, with the names of the several curates, the amount of each attached, and the length of the benefice in holy orders."

The following are the official returns just made by the enumerators appointed to take the census of the population of this City:—Parish of St. John, 1,385 houses, 6,039 males, 7,643 females, total population, 13,682; Parish of St. Mary, 356 houses, 2,775 males, 3,464 females, total population, 6,239; Parish of St. Nicholas, 667 houses, 2,852 males, 3,522 females, total population, 6,374; Parish of St. Munchin, 355 houses, 1,119 males, 1,512 females, total population, 2,709; Parish of Michael, 2,028 houses, 7,008 males, 9,074 females, total population, 16,082. Grand total—houses, 4791; males, 19,870; females, 25,216, both sexes making an aggregate of 45,086—thus giving the fairer part of the creation a majority of 5,346 in the City of Limerick.

According to this census compared with that of 1821, the increase of population in John's Parish is 1,772, in Mary's Parish 207, in Nicholas Parish 2,006, in Michael's Parish 914, and in Munchin's Parish a decrease of 840—Total increase of population 4,059.

The returns from 14 other parishes, including the suburbs and liberties of the City, are not yet completed.

The 76th Regiment marched from this garrison on Thursday morning for Mullingar by Killaloe. On leaving the barracks the Band struck up Rule Britannia as a quick step, in compliment to the 9th Regiment (who have the figure of Britannia for their Regimental Badge), with whom they have been lying both here and in Dublin for the last twelve months, and such was the unanimity and good feeling which prevailed between the two corps, that not a single instance of dissension occurred during the whole of that time; consequently we need not add, that these two gallant corps separate from each other with mutual respect and regret.

Yesterday, Sir George Bingham inspected the whole of the 74th Regiment, now in garrison, in full marching order, at the New Barracks. The Regiment mustered very strong and looked remarkably well under arms. The General Officer was pleased to express his satisfaction at the appearance of the 74th, the first division of which marches hence on Monday for Templemore.

On Tuesday, Captains Harrold and Burnett's companies of the 74th leave this garrison for Templemore.

This day the Brigade of Artillery, Colonel Worsley, and the 6th Carbineers, Lieutenant-Colonel Jackson, were inspected by Major-General Sir George Bingham.

The 92d Highlanders have received a route from Dublin for Clare. They expect to proceed by the canal boats.

The 92d Highlanders replace the detachments of the 76th in the County Clare, who will proceed to Mullingar, by Ennis.

On Monday next, the following six companies of the 9th Regiment will arrive in this garrison, being replaced by the 27th Eaniskilleners from Fermoy:—Captains Telford and Ogle's, under Major Watkins, from Cashel; Capt.
