William Egan was murdered near Johnstown on Tuesday
night, in an affray which took place in the neighbourhood
of the Race Course between two rival parties—the "white
feet" and "black." There were about 200 of these mis-
guided wretches engaged in the fight. Another person has
since died of the wounds he received in the conflict.

A woman named Eleanor Burns, late of Elphin, in the
county of Roscommon, died suddenly in Ennis on Thursday,
and a woman, named Catherine Crossen, died suddenly at
Kilmaly, near Ennis in the past week. Inquests were held
in each case, by Thomas Ivers, Esq. Coroner.

off his steward. Major Molloy made an effort to seize the
ruffian, but he—from his activity and the Major being ad-
vanced in years—made his escape.

We give the following from an authoritative source:

—One of those wanton and savage outrages, so frequent in
the country, has been committed on the person of the Rev.
Pat. Fitz-Gerald, of Ballingoola, in the Chapel-yard of
Loughmore, near Templemore, county Tipperary, and that
on the Sabbath-day, immediately after Mass. Mr. Fitz-
Gerald, having been informed, that the parishioners refused
to pay him the Tythe Composition, and that notices had
been posted up, threatening with death any one who should
demand it; in consequence of which the gentleman who
was in the habit of collecting for him had resigned the
office, thought, after advising with friends, that the most
conciliating plan he could adopt would be to go among the
people himself, and to expostulate with them on the subject.
To this he was the more inclined, having every reason to
suppose that they were kindly affected to him personally, as
he had, five years ago, at their own particular request, set
them the Tythes under composition, for £240, the price
proposed by themselves, instead of £400, which was then
their value, and, on that occasion, they had unanimously
expressed themselves greatly indebted to him for his mode-
ration, and determined to pay him punctually and cheerfully.
Mr. F. had also hoped that his politics would have secured
him a favourable hearing from his own parishioners. Ac-
cordingly, last Sunday, towards the conclusion of Mass, he
went unattended to the Chapel-yard, where were assembled
four or five hundred persons, and on his asking to see the
Priest, he was asked in return "what he wanted there, and
why he did not become a Christian?" He was then hustled
by the crowd, and shoved with great violence against the
wall. From this he had scarcely recovered, when he was
pushed and kicked about the Chapel-yard, by as many as
could get at him in the crowd. One man, of respectable
appearance, struck him violently on the head; while another
attempted twice to trip him, and to throw him headlong on
a narrow road filled with water and stones; and had they
succeeded he must inevitably have been crushed to death by
the immense crowd that were pressing him on every side.

At this while Mr. Fitz-Gerald, with his hat off, was begging
for life. At length he escaped into a house, which was im-
mediately surrounded by these savages, uttering the most
horrid yells, while some who forced in after him tried to get
him out again. Here he remained a full half hour under
the most frightful apprehensions, while he could see those out-
raged venting their rage by pelting with stones his horse. At
length some humane person gave the Priest, the Rev. Mr.
Butler, intimation of his danger, who with praise-
worthy promptitude came to his succour and addressing them
in very strong language, animadverted on "their cowardly
(as he called it) and ruffianly attempt on an innocent man,
who had come amongst them to talk with them on the most
