### SATURDAY, OCTOBER 15.

The Right Worshipful the Honourable John P. Vereker, Mayor held no less than five inquests this week, two on Thursday, and three yesterday. The first was Martin McNamara, who died in the County Gaol of fractured skull, refusing to give information against the persons who had inflicted the wound. The second was John McClean, who died of epilepsy. Third, Margaret McNamara, wife of a prisoner, John McNamara, and who was killed by her husband on Thursday night at their house in Irishtown, by pushing her violently against the wall, whereby the wife's skull was fractured. The husband has confessed the crime and is in custody. The fourth inquest was on the body of James Hilliard, who died in the Infirmary of fractures and contusions inflicted on him by a party at the cross of Bilboa, on Sunday night last. The fifth and last was on the body of a girl of three years, Ann Healy, whom it was suspected her father had killed in a fit of intoxication. This unhappy impression was removed on the examination of witnesses, and by medical testimony it appeared the little child died of convulsions.
