Deaths Occurred in the County of Cork.

On Wednesday evening, a party of seven or eight men, attacked the house of Patrick Keeffe, at Killenore, in the barony of Clanwilliam, with stones, on which Keeffe followed them out, and received a blow of a stone in the stomach, from the effects of which he died the night following.

A woman, named Margaret Dawdle, of the town of Tipperary, died on Friday night, from a wound she received on the head, inflicted by the blow of a stone given her on the evening of the fair day of that town.

A man named Thomas Ryan, of Sheanhill, also died some night from the effects of a beating he received the fair day.

On Saturday night, an armed party attacked the house of John Dwyer, of Tenoone, in the barony of Middlethard, and fired several shots; Dwyer returned the fire, on which the party made off.

Same night, Chief Constable Kelly, and party of Police, went to the lands of Luke, in the district of Eliogarty, to execute a warrant against some persons charged on oath with having assaulted the Police in the execution of their duty, on the 5th instant, and succeeded in arresting eleven persons, three of whom are fully identified, and committed for trial.

On Monday the Mayor held an inquest at Ballyclogh, on the body of Thomas Shine, who was choked the previous night at supper in attempting to swallow a bit of meat which stopped in the passage. Verdict accordingly. The marriage of this unfortunate man was fixed for next Sunday.

Sunday last, Mr. Cox, Coroner, held an inquest at Ballyphilip, near Croom, upon the body of Bridget Leo, who died of fractured skull, two men having assaulted her the previous Sunday, and struck her several blows on the head with stones, of which wounds she lingered until Saturday night last. The Coroner has issued his warrant against the murderers, whom she named in her dying declaration.

On the night of the 11th instant, a party of ruffians attempted to murder a Gentleman of the name of Wixted, near Bilbow. It was fortunate, however, the mistake was discovered in time, as their intention was to assassinate a gentleman, one of whose family not long since fell a victim to their snares.

The inhabitants of Beechaven have presented an address, with a piece of plate, to Henry Baldwin, Esq. Chief Officer of the Coast Guard, on his removal to Skell district.

The situation of Clerk of the Crown for the Counties of Cavan, Donegal, Fermanagh, Londonderry, and Tyrone, is vacant by the death of John Johnston, Esq.
