

the time for holding the Irish Term, which is to be permanently fixed. It is enacted after January 1832, Hilary Term, which for the 23d of January, shall commence on the 31st of January. Easter Term, which shall begin on the 15th of April, and end on Trinity Term is to begin on the 22d of May, 12th of June. Michaelmas Term, which was usually begun on the 5th, and ended on the 1st of October, will commence on the 2d, and end on 25th of October.

In case Sunday shall intervene, the Monday to be taken as the first or last day of each Term.

This Act contains a clause most important to the public, relative to County Quarter Sessions, the 10th section, the 1st and 2d of Geo. IV which regulated the time for holding General Sessions, is repealed, and by the 11th sec. it is enacted that the Assistant Barrister in each County (except County of Cork), shall, at the Quarter Session to each County, next before each Hilary Term, fix the time for holding each of the next four Sessions, for the entire year, of which due notice to be posted by the Clerk of the Peace, on the 1st of each year, and also six weeks before each Session, the 23d sec. any party aggrieved by any decree of the Supreme Courts.

Vokes, Esq. of Barton, for sheep stealing, Michael Tholy and John Dalton receiving same, knowing them to be stolen; James Annix for coining; Patrick Nash for gambling, sentenced three days or pay 1s. 6d. fine; Thomas O'Connell, sailor, for assault, to be imprisoned 14 days or pay 1s. 6d. fine; to be further imprisoned ten days for leaving his service; Michael Flinn fined 5s. or seven days imprisonment, for being drunk and disorderly in the streets; James O'Connell for the murder of his wife; by the Mayor, sentenced to 14 days imprisonment, or pay 1s. 6d. fine; Mary Mullins for assault, to be imprisoned one month or pay 1s. 6d. and costs.
