perhaps violence would be opposed to them in any efforts for
the removal of filth and manure—(hear.)
The Mayor perceived that in Cork they were moving all
the manure to one great heap outside the town, where the
poor man's portion was safe. He suggested if it would not
be well, to obviate difficulties, to procure a letter of sanction
from the Lord Lieutenant for carrying the Act into execution,
and then at next fitting opportunity to follow up the subsequent
steps at the sessions.
Alderman Watson, recommended that the Bell-man should
be sent through the City to give public notice for the removal
of all heaps of manure, before the infliction of penalties.
He thought it would be attended with good effects on the
poorer classes.
Mr. Roche said, it was well known that many poor families
supported themselves by the collection and sale of manure,
and he was apprehensive that any other but a power legally
constituted, offering to regulate this practice, might create a
tumult in the City.
A desultory conversation here ensued, and some appeared
to fear that if notice were given for the removal of nuisances,
they would only be changed to a more dangerous site, viz:—
removed to the miserable apartments where the poor congre-
gate, and be secreted even under their beds!
Mr. Gavin suggested, that if the heaps of manure collect-
ed by poor people were to be valued on oath before removal,
it would be a satisfaction.
Mr. Roche proposed a resolution, that the Mayor be re-
quested to get the Lord Lieutenant's authority, for enabling
the City to act upon the provisions of the 59 Geo. III. and to
procure advice as to the power of vestries—carried unani-
mously.
Alderman Mahony explained in reply to some inquiries,
that the Lord Lieutenant's recent Proclamation had reference
only to cases where the preliminaries of the 59th Geo. 3d,
chap. 41, had been observed, by the appointment at Ses-
sions of Officers of Health. That opportunity in this instance
was omitted, and they could only devise the best means for
rectifying the error, which the present meeting may recom-
mend.
The Mayor read a letter from the Recorder on the subject
of the clauses of the act 59 Geo. 3d. At present there was
no power to punish transgressors against cleanliness, except
by indictment or mandamus, as the occasion at Quarter
Sessions had been lost.
The Rev. John Fitzgibbon, Vicar, said that in John's pa-
rish a Board of Health was already established under the
58th Geo. 3d.
The Mayor explained that, under 58th Geo. 3d, a Board
of Health was paid by the Lord Lieutenant out of the Con-
solidated fund, and the sum so advanced was then repaid by
presentation on the Parish, but under the 59th Geo. 3d, they
had the liberty of taxing in Vestry as they pleased.
After some further argument, at the suggestion of Dr.
Ryan, Roman Catholic Bishop, it was unanimously agreed
to, that Vestries be held on Monday, the 28th inst. in the
several Parishes of the City, for appointing Officers of
Health, and that in the interim the Mayor would be pleased
to communicate to them the result of his correspondence on
the subject with the Lord Lieutenant.
Doctor Ryan was then called to the chair, and on the
motion of William Roche, Esq. seconded by Michael Gavin,
Esq. the thanks of the meeting were returned to the Mayor
una voce.

The Mayor of Galway called a meeting on Wednesday to
form a Board of Health in that town.
At a meeting of the parish of Holy Trinity, Cork, on
Wednesday, Officers of Health were nominated, and an ap-
plotment of £500 on the parish agreed to, under the 59th
Geo. III. The sum applotted on Paul, a parish of 4,000
paupers, under the provisions and for the purposes in the
same act, was £220; for St. Mary's, Shandon, £450; and
in this parish there is a mass of misery, no less than 3,000
human beings in want of clothes, fuel, and food,—while
there are 10,000 paupers in Saint Anne, Shandon!—
The Mayor of Cork presided at a general meeting of the
citizens on Thursday, when the names of Parochial Officers
of Health were returned, and a list of the sums assessed in
each Parish,—which latter was found insufficient, and the
meeting determined upon a general subscription,—and should
this fail, the Magistrates will recommend an assessment of
3d. in the pound on the City.
The Sub-Committees appointed to visit the abodes of the
poorer classes in Waterford, under the apprehension of
Cholera Morbus, represent the scenes they have witnessed
as the most filthy, wretched, and appalling that can be im-
agined in human society.
Captain Robinson, a Governor of the House of Industry,
Cork, was formally expelled the Board on Wednesday for
gross language to the female inmates, by a majority of 24
to four. This process was necessary, as he had not sent in
his resignation. The resolution as proposed by Mr. Cummins
was this—"That Capt. Robinson is unworthy of being associ-
ated with at this Board."
All applicants for a situation in the Irish Constabulary
