ments of dragoons, in aid of the civil authorities. Lord Hill, in naming Major Beckwith, of the 14th Dragoons, last in point of time, as that officer only arrived in Bristol on the Monday morning, assured him that his services were by no means less important than those of the other officers named; but that, on the contrary, his Lordship had abundant evidence of Major Beckwith's promptitude and success in applying the military means entrusted to his care. In communicating Lord Hill's orders to the troops, the Major-General expressed himself peculiarly happy in being able to do so on the very ground where their services had been rendered.

A division of the 91st Regiment is stationed at Worcester. A narrative of the late insurrection in Bristol, by Major Digby Mackworth, Aide-de-Camp to General Lord Hill, will be seen in our columns.

The levees of the General Commanding-in-Chief at the Horse Guards have been for the present discontinued, in consequence of the absence of Lord Hill, who has departed for his seat, Hardwicke Grange, near Shrewsbury. Sir Rowland Hill is nephew and heir presumptive of the General Commanding-in-Chief.

An order has been issued to the Army, directing that each soldier shall immediately, as a measure tending to health, be made to wear a flannel belt. One yard and a half long, and seven inches wide, round the lower part of the body, thus protecting the abdomen, and the loins, and the small of the back.

Lieutenant-Colonel Dickson, of the 64th Regiment, has circulated a statement of the particulars which led to the recent encounter at Belfast between himself and Mr. Ravenscroft, late Captain in the 64th. He explains that on the night of a fire at Belfast, Captain Ravenscroft, the officer on duty, was intoxicated, and that he was in consequence ordered into arrest, with the option of selling out his commission or standing a Court Martial, the latter he refused, and Captain Laurell was gazetted to his rank. Subsequently Mr. Ravenscroft sent a hostile message to Colonel Dickson, which the latter refused to notice, and the result was that Mr. Ravenscroft made several blows of a stick at the Colonel in the streets of Belfast, which Colonel Dickson parried with his sword, and slightly wounded the aggressor. Colonel Dickson explains that his conduct in the affair met the approbation of his superiors and brother officers, but that he was severely reprimanded by a higher authority for his lenity to Mr. Ravenscroft.

The Colonelcy of the Monaghan Regiment of Militia is vacant by the death of Charles Powell Leslie, Esq. many years Representative for that County in Parliament. The Regiment is in the gift of Lord Rossmore, Lieutenant of the County Monaghan.

The Rev. Edward M. Denny, for the last thirteen years Rector of Tralee, has resigned the charge of that parish in favour of the Rev. Anthony Denny, brother of Sir Edward Denny, Bart. for whom the living was held in trust.

The Rev. Anthony Denny was only admitted to Priests Orders at Elphin Cathedral on Sunday week, by the Lord Bishop of that diocese.

The Lord Bishop of Cloyne has appointed the Rev. Pierce William Drew to the Curacy of Cove, lately held by the Rev. Mr. Woodward.

The Reform Meeting invited by public advertisement did not assemble at the Linen-Hall, last Thursday, as expected. The reason assigned was the inclemency of the weather—The Commercial Buildings Coffee Room is now selected as the theatre for a public meeting, and the day fixed next Monday.

The High Sheriff of Cork has called a County Meeting for the first of December, on the Reform question.

Sunday night, the roof and walls of a cottage, held by Thomas Kerly, a farmer, at Monateen, near this City, fell in and buried in the ruins a fine boy of nine years, his son, who was taken out perfectly dead. Three females in the house had a most providential escape.

An Act having passed the last Session of Parliament for the collection of the Presentments made by the Grand Jury of the County Clare at Spring Assizes 1831, which were not collected at the usual period, in consequence of the then disturbed state of the County, and the time for collection of the levy at last Summer Assizes having since arrived, the County Treasurer has just issued his warrants to the several Baronial High Constables for collecting both assessments—The acreable cess varies from 1s. to 1s. 7d. per acre on the County generally, for Spring and Summer levies.

A monument is about to be erected by subscription to the memory of the late Rev. John Murphy, P. P. of Corofin.

We (Limerick Chronicle) received this morning the following from Sunderland, dated November 22, 1831—

"Sir,—Dr. Barry arrived here yesterday, he is sent down by Government to assist Dr. Daun. The sickness, I hope will soon abate. This place is in general very unhealthy at this time of the year—in fact, there were as many deaths during the same period last year. The soldiers in the garrison have had no communication with the town since the 6th instant, not even the women or children allowed out of the gates. In the day time the men amuse themselves with foot-ball, jumping, racing, &c. and in the evening Amateur Theatricals, a concert, or a dance. I hope soon to be able to inform you that the sickness has disappeared and the gates thrown open, for I assure you we feel quite dull, not seeing any of the red coats in the streets."
