Accounts from Madras, received yesterday at this Office, left the 55th Regiment and Colonel Brock in good health.

The 19th Reserve have arrived at Burnley, where they succeed the 33d Reserve. The 19th have been since the 25th of October last, constantly on the move in the counties of Huntingdon, Nottingham, and Lincoln, and at the following stations successively, Huntingdon, Newark, Grantham, and Stamford.

Five Soldiers deserted in a squad from the 24th Regt., at Isle Aux Noix, Canada, last September, carrying the whole of their regimental necessaries.—A similar desertion occurred same month, from the 15th Regiment at Montreal.

Drum Major John Stevens, of the 56th Regiment, has been discharged at Cork on the embarkation of the corps for the West Indies, with a certificate from the Commanding Officer, conveying the highest approbation of his soldierlike and exemplary behaviour in the 56th for a period of 27 years, and recommending him for the usual pension, besides Medal for good conduct.

One Colonel, two Lieutenant-Colonels, six Captains, and four subalterns of the Royal Engineers are to be placed upon half-pay at the end of the present year, and no promotion is to take place in the corps until these officers are restored to full pay. Capt. Grierson, Royal Engineers, is ordered to embark on board the Isis, for the river Gambia.

Alfred Bateman, a private of the 60th Rifles, deserted from the Regiment a few days ago near Manchester, after robbing the corps of 62 sovereigns and two £5 notes.

The Rev. John O'Grady, of Kilballyowen, is appointed by the Earl Kenmare to the Vicarage of Any, Co. Limerick, void by the death of the Rev. John Preston.

The Rev. Richard Lee, Curate of Upper Shandon, has been promoted, by the Lord Bishop of Cork, to the Prebend of Inskenny, vacant by the appointment of the Rev. W. Meade to the parish of Dunmanway. Though only recently appointed the Bishop has promoted the two senior Curates of that City; and no more deserving Clergymen in every respect could be selected for such distinction.

At an Ordination held at the Cathedral by the Lord Bishop of Cork, on Sunday, the following Gentlemen were ordained: For Priests orders—Messrs. Herbert, Ringwood, Blakeley, Walker, O'Neill, Madras and Harman. For Deacons orders: Messrs. Lewis, Molesworth, Crossweight, Brady, Drapes. The Bishop on Friday last examined the Candidates, for several hours, in parts of the course prescribed in the Diocese. The Archdeacon also examined, and preached the Ordination Sermon.

The Mayor and Corporation, in full regalia, will attend Divine Service at the Cathedral to-morrow, being Christmas day, where the Very Rev. the Dean will preach.

Patrick's Well, near this City, is appointed a Penny Post-Office. Glanmire and Blackrock, near Cork, have also Penny Post-Offices.

Crofton Moore Vandeleur, Esq. has arrived in Rutland-square, Dublin, from his seat, Kiltrush.

The County Limerick Quarter Sessions commence on Tuesday next at Rathkeale, before Assistant Barrister Cruise.

Eight men were committed to Kilkenny gaol on Sunday, for the massacre of the Police at Knocktopher. There are fifteen of the unfortunate Police party dangerously ill in the Infirmary.

Government has placed at the disposal of Colonel Evans, C.B., Military Commandant at Kilkenny, 1,200 infantry, and six squadrons of cavalry, besides a powerful artillery. This is exclusive of the constabulary, yeomanry corps, and militia staff.

Col. Osborne, Police Magistrate, has arrived in Kilkenny from Clare. It will depend upon the report of Sergeant Gould and Mr. Greene, K.C. if Government issues a Special Commission for Kilkenny.

Lord Oxmantown, Colonel Bernard, and the principal Magistrates and gentry of the King's County have passed a series of resolutions at Banagher, deploring the commission of outrages in that quarter, and pledging themselves to enforce the law against illegal and mischievous associations from which nothing has sprung but evil.

The Earl of Shannon, Lieutenant of the County Cork, has received a letter from the Lord Chancellor, apprising that Nobleman in his official capacity, that "the new Commission of the Peace will be very shortly issued, by which the functions of the Magistrates will cease, and any act done by them before they qualify under the new Commission will be illegal. It is important, therefore, to prevent inconvenience that they should apply without delay for a *Dedimus*, to enable them to take the oaths under the new Commission." A copy of this Commission was received yesterday by the Clerk of the Peace for the County Cork.—A similar letter has been received by Lord Donoughmore for Tipperary.

It is in contemplation of the gentry residing in the vicinage of Newmarket, county Clare, to establish a Farming Society in that district, which must prove of inestimable service to the agricultural interests of Clare.
