Has he not proved himself the steadfast friend and advocate of the Established Church, both as a Temporal and Spiritual Peer? Where and when has he neglected the great interests confided to his care? Is it in appointment of his representative the Vicar-General? The Clergy of the diocese will answer that question for Doctor Forster, who, in the acquirements of a scholar, and the devotion of a strict Churchman, has not lost sight of the courtesies and manners essential to the Gentleman and Divine. Has our enlightened Prelate forgotten the character of the true Christian in his elevation to the Mitre? Look for a reply to his liberal contributions in support of our public Charities, remember the amiable founder of our Sick and Indigent Roomkeepers' Society, (that imperishable monument of a good heart)—and would that I could enumerate his acts of munificence in private life, for here too there is room for eloquent gratitude, but I hope I have said enough to remove any erroneous impression against our worthy Diocesan.—I am, Sir, your obedient Servant,
