All Accounts due to this Establishment to the 1st of January, 1832, are requested to be discharged forthwith.

This morning the head-quarter division of the 9th Regiment, under Lieut. Colonel Custance, with band and colours, and Captains Barnwell, Telford, and Douglas' companies, marched hence for Cork by the circuitous route of Tipperary, Cashel, Cahir, Cloheen, Fermoy, Cork. The remaining companies, viz. Captains Seward, Ogle, and Dalton's, follow on Friday. They arrive in Cork on the 18th and 20th inst. Lieutenants Sands, Donnelly, Jackson, Harper, Kerr, and Ensign Hoskin, accompanied the division this morning—and Major Champain commands the division on Friday.

The cause assigned for the march of the 9th through Tipperary is the general disaffection of the peasantry to tythes, and to the Ministers of the Established Church. Besides symptoms of an attack on the country bridewells were manifested at Clogheen and Cashel.

The 9th Regiment, under orders for Gibraltar, only returned to this country in 1827, from the West Indies. They are an excellent corps and remarkably well conducted.

This day the first division of the Reserve Companies of the 67th Regiment from Dublin, marched into this garrison, and will occupy the New Barracks. The Depot is composed of the following Officers:—Major Johnson; Captains Warburton, Deverell, Brevet Major Stuart, and Hewitt; Lieutenants Bolton (Paymaster), James (Adjutant), Whyte, and Davie; Ensign Irwin, and Assistant-Surgeon Cumming.

The second battalion of the Royals has landed at Leith from Chatham, and marched immediately to Edinburgh.—This battalion has but just arrived in England after 23 years service in India.

The head-quarters of the 47th Regiment are now stationed in Belfast, and the head-quarters of the 90th Light Infantry at Glasgow.

The Reserve Companies of the 11th Regiment have arrived in Bristol from Merthyr Tydwell, where they were replaced by 100 of the 98th Reserve from Brecon.

A Majority in the Carlow Militia Regiment is vacant. Two Sergeant-Majors of Infantry are promoted in the last Gazette to the rank of Quarter-Masters.

Captain Gipps, Royal Engineers, and the other Commissioners, who arrived here to make enquiries of the number of population, registry, and houses, have left for Dublin, after effecting the object of their mission.

Captain Ogden Creighton, half-pay Unattached, has been allowed to retire from the service, by the sale of an unattached commission.

His Majesty has been pleased to approve of the 82d Regiment retaining the appellation of "The Prince of Wales's Veterans," in addition to its present number, and of its bearing the "Prince of Wales's Plume," with the above title, on its colours and appointments.

The 25th Regiment, or King's Borderers, was raised at Edinburgh in the Christmas of 1689, by the Earl of Leven, under commission from King William the 3d.—The 25th embarked for the West Indies in Christmas 1825, since which the Regiment has lost 250 men by sickness.

The stations of the several Cavalry and Infantry Regiments composing the British Army, to this day, will be seen in our columns.

On Sunday night, a large party of men, some of whom were armed with guns, attacked and entered the house of Michael Fogarty, of Coagilla, near Cashel, and robbed it of £12 10s. in cash, and afterwards beat the family severely. The party fired 6 or 7 shots on going off.

As a son of the Rev. Mr. Armstrong's, of Clonkelly, was returning home from Dunderm House, county Tipperary, (about 8 o'clock), where he had been spending the evening, with Lord Hawarden's Agent, he was met by a single man, who fired at him, and wounded him severely. Dr. Ryan, from Cashel, was sent for to dress his wounds, and it is considered the young gentleman is out of danger.

On Saturday last, one of these scenes of barbarity which we regret to say, often characterises the feuds of the lower orders, occurred on the lands of Knockraun, in this County; three brothers, named Power, went to a neighbouring farm, to get possession of some land which was willed by their deceased brother to his children—on entering the land they were opposed by a man named Nash, who it seems has married the widow of the elder brother, a conflict arose, in which Thomas Power was dreadfully wounded by a pitchfork in the side, which entered the chest and wounded the lungs. John Power had his skull fractured by a blow of a stone—Maurice Power was stabbed in many parts of the body with a sharp instrument. The three brothers are under the care of Surgeon Franklin, jun. who entertains little hopes of the recovery of two of them. Thomas P. Vokes, Esq. with that activity for which he is so famed, lost very little time in having the principals in this horrid outrage arrested, and committed fully for trial at the ensuing Assizes.

On Friday last a farmer named William Harnett, who resided on Dromtrasna, the estate of the Right Hon. Lord Viscount Guillamore, near Abbeyfeale, attended Newcastle Petit Sessions on business, with some of his relatives,—and just as he was setting out for home in the evening, a furious attack was made on him and his friends by a party who lay in wait for them. William Harnett was knocked down by a blow on the left side of the head with a flat stone, which laid his head bare, without causing the least fracture. After being removed into a house, he walked without assistance to another part of the town, and was not considered in any danger by his friends, until next morning when they became alarmed; but it was too late,—a blood-vessel had been ruptured, and he died before twelve o'clock on Saturday.—Edmond Haugh, the person charged with this outrage, has been fully committed. His accomplices are not likely to evade the activity of the Magistrates and Police. Until very lately (says our correspondent) there was little to complain of in the way of factious outrage in Newcastle. That disgraceful system having been completely put down by the Magistrates at Quarter Sessions. Every offence of that nature should be treated as matter of much public concern; and exemplary punishment would overawe and reclaim the factious, while it secured protection and tranquillity to the peaceable and industrious.—An Inquest was held on the body of William Harnett by John Cox, Esq. the Coroner of the County, before a respectable Jury, attended by Dr. Pierce of Newcastle, and Mr. Furlong. Verdict—That the deceased got his death from the wounds received in his head from several persons, three of whom are known.

Henry Hickey, a countryman, was murdered last week, on his return from the fair of Mullough to Knockbrack, Miltown Malbay. A verdict of wilful murder is returned against Murrough M'Inerney and Patrick Mingane.

The eleven persons sentenced to transportation by the Recorder at the Sessions just ended, will, it is expected, be moved to the Hulk at Cove in a few days.

The County Quarter Sessions terminated on Saturday evening, and next day Mr. Cruise, the Chairman, left town for Dublin. The only convictions were—James Meade, sentenced to one month's imprisonment and to stand in the pillory, for perjury; James Jobson and William Fitzmaurice, for stealing butter, to be transported for seven years; Edmond Russell, for stealing "a goose," to be imprisoned one month.

Andrew Roche, a hair-cutter of Cork, has served a notice on the executors of the late Thos. Rochfort of Garretstown, Esq. warning them that he is the sole heir to his property.

Lord Glentworth, has enrolled himself a member of the Western Yacht Club. A ballot for the admission of members is to take place in this City the 10th of next month.

We can assure our respected Cotemporary, the Evening Mail, that he has been misinformed, when he states that it is the course in the Limerick Post-Office, to extract Newspapers from the covers, and lend them to loungers. The Limerick Post-Office is in charge of a very attentive and vigilant Post-master, and however the accusation may apply to village Post-offices, it certainly does not implicate this.
