

A Majority in the Carlow Militia Regiment is vacant. Two Sergeant-Majors of Infantry are promoted in the last Gazette to the rank of Quarter-Masters.

Captain Gipps, Royal Engineers, and the other Commissioners, who arrived here to make enquiries of the number of population, registry, and houses, have left for Dublin, after effecting the object of their mission.

Captain Ogilvie Creighton, half-pay Unattached, has been allowed to retire from the service, by the sale of an unattached commission.

His Majesty has been pleased to approve of the 82d Regiment retaining the appellation of "The Prince of Wales's Veterans," in addition to its present number, and of its bearing the "Prince of Wales's Plume," with the above title, on its colours and appointments.

The 25th Regiment, or King's Borderers, was raised at Edinburgh in the Christmas of 1689, by the Earl of Leven, under commission from King William the 3d—The 25th embarked for the West Indies in Christmas 1825, since which the Regiment has lost 250 men by sickness.

The stations of the several Cavalry and Infantry Regiments composing the British Army, to this day, will be seen in our columns.

A General Court-Martial is sitting at the Castle Barracks, for trial of some privates in garrison.

The charges against Colonel Brereton, inspecting Field Officer on the Recruiting Staff at Bristol, appear in our columns. The Court Martial is adjourned until after the Bristol Commission.

Mr. Earle has been specially sent for to defend Colonel Brereton on his trial before the Court-Martial.

During the Perry Alt campaign in Clare and Galway, it is stated that four Majors who then held magisterial commissions, were given to expect promotion for their services. The hope however is not yet realised.

Reduction and Reform are making a sweeping change in Ireland. In Dublin the Colonel, Officers, and Yeomen of the Battle-axe-Guard, an old appendage of Vice-regal state, are extinguished, also the State Physician, State Surgeon, Comptrollers, Stewards, Chamberlains, Ushers, Masters of Ceremonies, and all the minor attaches. Verily we are coming fast to the condition of a degraded Province!

Lieutenant Byrne, of the 82d Regiment, has succeeded Lieutenant D. Alt, of the 63d, in the superintendance of the Recruiting service at Newcastle-under-Line.

The colours of the Down Militia Regiments have been deposited by the Colonel with the Marquess of Downshire, Lieutenant of that County.

The Magisterial Commissions for all the Counties in Ireland were sealed on Saturday last.

Thomas A. Odell, of Odell-Ville, Esq. a Magistrate of the Counties of Tipperary, Kerry, and Limerick, for the last forty years, has resigned in consequence of ill health.

William H. W. Newenham, Esq. presided at the meeting of the Magistrates of the County Cork on Friday, when it was resolved that the demand for additional fees on the renewal of their Commissions was unreasonable, and that a Memorial on the subject be sent to the Lord Lieutenant.

The Magistrates of the County Clare are about to meet, and express their feeling upon the charge for new Commissions.

Major Tandy, Chief Magistrate of Police, has left Kildare, for London, to attend the Parliamentary Committee on tythes.

Last year's Committee of Barrington's Hospital and City Infirmary, were re-elected at a general meeting on Monday, with the exception of the Lord Bishop of Limerick, in whose place Pierce Shannon, Esq. was chosen.

A letter from a military officer at Gateshead, received at this office yesterday, says that he had seen 35 funerals there the day before writing.

Nearly three weeks have elapsed since application was made by two Magistrates to the Castle of Dublin, for filling up the vacancies in the Eunis Board of Health, and no answer is yet received.

A grown girl, named Mary Smith, daughter of a poor couple, was drowned yesterday under very melancholy circumstances. She went to the Abbey slip for water, and while in the act of stooping to recover her can which the tide had disturbed, fell in beyond her depth and was immediately carried off by the rapidity of the current. She floated a considerable distance, passed under Baal's-bridge, between the Malls, and was visible to many persons. Her hands were seen two or three times over the water as if imploring assistance, but in vain, and she finally disappeared near the New Bridge. It is painful to say that this young woman was suffered to perish without any exertion to save her, in a City which is remarkable for good swimmers, several of whom must have been viewing the sad spectacle. The parents have been since wandering through the streets in a state of mind bordering upon distraction, and the exclamations of the father were truly distressing.

John Donovan, a deserter from the 10th Regiment; David Evans, from the 50th; and Thomas Godfrey, from the 99th, are now in our gaol, previous to Court-Martial.

Ellen Hurley, who lately escaped from the City Gaol, is apprehended by Sergeant Johnston of the Police, and sent to her former habitation.

Twenty-seven farmers are committed to Clogheen bridge-well by Lord Lismore, and the Magistrates at Petit Sessions, for throwing down the dwelling-house of John Abern, in the employ of Mr. Langley, and depriving him of a pistol. The offence amounts to a capital felony. An attempt to free the prisoners from custody was frustrated by the Police.

Edmond Russell, for stealing "a goose," to be imprisoned one month.

Andrew Roche, a hair-cutter of Cork, has served a notice on the executors of the late Thos. Rochfort of Garretstown, Esq. warning them that he is the sole heir to his property.

Lord Glentworth, has enrolled himself a member of the Western Yacht Club. A ballot for the admission of members is to take place in this City the 10th of next month.

We can assure our respected Cotemporary, the Evening Mail, that he has been misinformed, when he states that it is the course in the Limerick Post-Office, to extract Newspapers from the covers, and lend them to loungers. The Limerick Post-Office is in charge of a very attentive and vigilant Post-master, and however the accusation may apply to village Post-offices, it certainly does not implicate this.
