Purefov's estate in Tipperary. The Magistrates in ... County (Limerick), we are assured, will discountenance every manifestation of popular violence against a lawful and acknowledged provision for the Established Church.

Monday last, the village of Newport was thrown into a state of great terror and consternation by the appearance of two powerful factions named Kennedy and Murnane, who came in to fight an opposite party of the name of Devitt .-In consequence of the admonition of the Priest on Sunday, the latter faction did not appear, but for fear of a collision Major Carter, Chief Magistrate, with a company of the 74th Regiment, from Nenagh, and a strong detachment of Police, arrived early in the day, and remained until the Kennedys and Murnaues had dispersed. The latter had armed themselves with sticks, scythes, and guns. Monday uext, however, has been appointed for the grand conflict between those sanguinary miscreants, but we hope an exemplary punishment will await them.

A notice was posted at Cross, county Clare, on Christmas day, desiring all strangers to quit, and a man of the name of Gibson, not to attempt to go to the Ennistimon Sessions to follow up the processes he sent out, or that he should lose his life-also letting Cuptain Cox know, that they would bring a hundred men to every Policeman that he had in his

house, and have his life.

The Police party stationed on the Kilrush road, have apprehended Michael Phillips, charged with the murder of

Serjeant Robinson, 5th Foot.

A short time since while a party of Police from Carrigabolt, were escorting two prisoners to Kilrush, they were attacked by a mob and pelted with stones, and they declared if the prisoners were taken for any of Terry Alts crimes they should not bring them. However, the persons that had the informations against the prisoners were among the crowd, and their presence prevented the intended rescue.

John Duncan, Esq. C.C.P with a party of police under his command, after a long and fatiguing search, on Tuesday night, succeeded in apprehending near Bodike, Patrick Barry, charged as being principal in the inhuman murder of Molony, the herdsman, near Crutlee. The conduct of Mr. Duncan is most praiseworthy in securing this ruffian, who has escaped the ends of justice since the perpetration of the dreadful act. He was conveyed to Euris gaol under a strong escort of the 92d Highlanders.

On Mouday, two armed ruffinus went to Barnakella, near Lisduff, county Galway, in search of Michael Treasy and John Whealon, who were served with Terry Alt notices to surrender their holdings, and did not comply. Not finding Treasy and Whealon, the Terries swore they came there to take their lives, as they were appointed and sworn by their

Committee to do so. They then fired two shots and left notices to the above effect.

A few nights ago, Pat. Warren, residing at Kill, county Galway, was attacked by a party of Terry Alts, well armed, who dragged him out of his house and beat him nearly to death for saying that the Terry Alts were bad fellows.

The house of a poor man named Michael Calnan, near Spring-grove, county Galway, was foreibly entered by a porty of Terry Aits, well armed, who dragged him out of his bed and nearly murdered him. On asking why they were beating him, they answered for giving lodging to a man named Lally, whom they considered an informer.

On Wednesday, as James Nevin was serving processes, for the Quarter Sessions of Loughrea, he was waylaid at Spring-grove, in the barony of Longford, by two armed men, who beat him in a most unmerciful manner, leaving him as they supposed dead. They took all the originals from him, first swearing him never to serve a process again,

On Friday night, the dwelling house of John Kerwan in the parish of Killimore, co. Galway, was forcibly entered by a large party of Terry Alts. They got possession of his gen in prime condition. They then went and broke open his desk and took thereout powder and ball, together with

A man was murdered in the parish of Moore, county Galway, on Tuesday night last-he was commonly called

English Jack.

Sunday night a mob of anti-Tythe Payers attacked the house of Peter Daly, Esq. of Corbaly, county Galway, and dashed in the windows with clubs and staves, breaking the frames to pieces. Mr. Daly's driver rescued a blunderbuss from one of the assailants, but all the others made off, and have not since been heard off.

William K. Prendergast, Esq. Bettyville, has received the thanks of the Lord Lieutenont, thro' Sir William Goesett, for assisting the Police to arrest one of the armed ruffians who attacked the house of Mrs Lynch, at Cartron, county Galway,

and carried away the fire arms.

An attempt, by the peasantry, to force the budewell of Clogheen, and liberate therefrom 28 prisoners committed by Lord Lismore, was made this week, but it happily failed owing to the resolute conduct of the Magistrates and Police, supported by a military detachment from Caher. One fellow who sculed the walls of the Bridewell was fired at and re-

This week a notice was posted on the Chapel of Bully. martle, county Cork, warning the parishioners against paying tythe to the Rev Mr. Stoyte, the Incumbent.

Monday last, an armed band attacked the house of Lord Kingston's ranger, on the Gaultee mountains, beat him severely, and carried off his fire-arms.

A few nights past only an armed party attacked the house of John Vaughan, near Kantuck, and robbed him of £50, besides a quantity of wearing apparel.

James Meade was this day pillored in front of the County Court-House, surrounded by a strong guard of horse and foot, He was convicted of perjury at the last Sessions.

Limerick, January 13, 1832. In October 1830, the Bishop of Limerick sanctioned M Houre's appointment to the Curacy of St. John's parish; which was notified to him, accordingly, by Mr. Fitzgibbon, the incumbent. A few days, however, before Mr. Hoare's arrival in Limerick, I received the following letter from his Lordship :-

Leamington, Nov. 6, 1830.

My Dear Dr Forster, I have this moment received the strongest reasons, for immediately, as I now do, inhibiting Mr. Houre from officiating not only within the City, but within the Diocese of Limerick. I hope he has not yet been licensed-At all

events, for the present, he is inhibited. Your's my dear Sir, in great haste,

JOHN LIMERICK Mr. Hoare's appointment was, of course, suspended. On the 13th of November the Bishop wrote me as follows

Leamington, Nov. 13, 1830.

My dear Sir, The communication which I had, relative to Mr. Hoare, made it my duty, at cace, to suspend him, and to write to the Archbishop of Tuam. I have received such an answer, as enables me to withdraw the suspension : at the same time, there is reason to fear, that Mr. Houre has held, and put forward strange and antinomian views. He should be told this; he should be privately and solemnly warned on the subject; he should be told, that he is under surveillance; and he should be directed, to submit his servious to you for inspec-tion. Under present circumstance, and with the lights I have, I am only consider him to be on trial; and the least movement in questionable nature on his part, must cause a withdrawal of my liceuse. My hope, however, is, that the son of a Futher so long connected with the Diocese of Limerick, and the nephew of William Houre, will so conduct himself, as to merit by approbation. Your best plan will be to read so much of his letter to Mr. Houre, and also to Mr. FitzGibbon.

There would still be ground enough to reject him, and let him fall back on his Ardagh Curacy, were that now in his power:- The Archbishop of Tam writes me, however, that the Curacy in Ardago has been resigned, and given away; and it would be a pardship almost automating to persecution, to turn him adrift now, unless, after tair warning, he were

guilty of absolute uncanonical irregularity. My dear Sir,

TO BE READ TO MR. HOARE .- " Mr. Houre is never to preach extempore or without notes; he must always be able to show each sermon exactly as it was preached from the pulpit. On failing in this respect, his license is to be with-

I read this letter to Mr. Houre, in presence of Mr. Fitzgibbon : at which time, he accepted the curacy, under the conditions therein specified, and afterwards took, and sub-

scribed, the oath of Canonical obedience.

About July, 1831, Mr. Houre began to depart from the observance of those conditions. On my remonstrating with him, he assured me that he had misapprehended the Bishop's meaning, and conceived they were but temporary,-intended only for the present. I corrected his misapprehension, as I thought; and did hope that, in future, he would adhere to the Bishop's direction. In this hope, however, I was mistaken. If Mr. Hoare has said, that, in the conversation he had with me, he did not give me explicitly to understand that he would observe those conditions, if he had any mental reservation, all I shall say is, I wish he had been more caudid. I should then have known what course to take. Subsequently, it is true, on receiving from me an official letter, containing a transcript of his Lordship's order, he did, in a measure, submit to it. And, as it had been previously arranged between him and Mr. Fitzgibbon, that he was to give up the curacy in November, he might have retired from the Diocese without any public mark of his Diocesan's disapprobation. His license would not have been formally retracted. But when he, a clergyman of the established Church, with a curate's license still in his possession, (for he had not, in strict form, resigned his curacy), publiely proposed, and deliberately persisted in his purpose, to open an unauthorized Chapel, in opposition both to canon and statute law, and disregard of Episcopal authority, which he was solemnly bound to obey, -it was then, and not till then, that the Bishop resolved to inhibit him.

This will appear from the annexed extract. It is the very last communication I have had from his Lordship on the

subject. Leamington, December 26, 1831.

My dear Dr. Forster, Mr. Houre's license must be, at once, withdrawn; and this you are hereby authorized and required to do; and to notice my Clergy, that Mr. Hoare's license having crased to exist, they are not to allow of his officiating, either in their Reading Desks, Pulpits, or in any other way in their Churches or Parishes
