To the Editor of the Limerick Chronicle.

Sir, -In the statement which appeared in your Paper of he 14th instant from the Vicar General of the Diocese, it is cknowledged that the Inhibition which has recently been ssued against me would never have been so issued had I not esolved upon the opening of an additional Place of Worship a this city. It is a source of satisfaction to myself, and to he friends of the cause with which I am identified in this ity, to have had this important fact so plainly stated rom the best authority. To this charge I plead guilty. have indeed resolved upon this course, and, by God's help, am determined to continue therein. In doing so, I comply vith the expressed wishes of a large and respectable portion f the P. otestant inhabitants of this City; and I seek, with hem, to make provision for the permanent preaching of the iospel of Christ in a City, where, it must be acknowledged y all, an additional Place of Worship for members of the Established Church is much required.

It is a mistake to suppose that our proceeding in this mater is against the statute law; the best legal opinion has been aken on this point, and it appears that there exists no law n Ireland against the opening of such a Chapel. It is true, here does exist a canou (the 21st of the Irish Canons of 1634) gainst it. But the 58th of the same Canons "for the behoof f the subjects of this land, and that hetter provision be nade, that henceforward they be not grieved with frivolous and wrongful suits and molestations," it is ordained, that o Inhibition be granted "unless it be subscribed by an Advocate practising in the Court"; and by the 59th of the aid Cunons "it is ordered and decreed," that "before the joing out of any such Inhibition an appeal be exhibited to he Judge or his lawful Surrogate, "whereby he may be ally informed both of the quality of the crime, and the ause of the grievance, before the granting of such Inhibiion"; and it is further ordained, that "if any Judge or legister shall either procure or permit any Inhibition to be ealed, so as is said, contrary to the form and limitation above pecified, let him be suspended from the execution of his ffice for the space of three months"; and further, " if any roctor, or other person whatsoever by his appointment, shall ffend in any of these premises, either by making or sending u: any Inhibition, contrary to the tenor of the said premises, et him be removed from the exercise of his office for the pace of a whole year, without hope of release or restoring." 'hese Canons, ordained "for the behoof of the subjects of his land," have not been observed in the late proceedings gainst me .- Again, the 42d of these Canons forbids Clerymen "spending their time idly by day or by night, nor hall they give themselves to playing at dice, eards, or tables, r any other game unbecoming their function." Is this lanon as rigidly enforced as the 21st, which forbids "Minisers to preach or administer the Communion in private ouses," which if put in force would prove highly detrimental o the cause of religion in this country, as it would effectually revent Clergymen from lecturing in School-rooms and the

ottages of the poor. But ! never "swore" to obey these Canons. I did, at ay ordination, solemnly promise that I would "endeavour ayself," "reverently to obey my Ordinary, and other chief dinisters of the Church, and them to whom the charge and overnment over me is committed, following with a glad and and will their godly admonitions." Now, in the preeat case, I have not transgressed this promise; for, in the rst place, the Bishop refused to take "the charge and goernment" over our Chapel and the Minister thereof, which e had been solicited to do on three several occasions during he last eight years, and which he may still do if it be his leasure; and secondly, I do not consider in the light of a godly admonition," the prohibiting a numerous and repectable body of Protestants of the Church of England havig a second Place of Worship in a parish containing a popution of 16,000 souls, and without a Parish Church, or any lace of worship for members of the Established Church, xcept a Chapel, which, not habing been ever consecrated y the Bishop, and the Minister not being licensed thereto, similarly situated with the one which we propose to stablish; nor do I consider it a "godly admonition" to hibit me from exercising the office of the Ministry to hich I have been ordained, and from fulfilling the comand of my Lord and Master, to "go, and preach the lospel to every creature

But, although it has been acknowledged that the resoluon to open an additional Place of Worship has been the sole ause of the proceedings lately taken against me, yet in se Vicar General's statement other charges are implied.

It appears that it was represented to the Pishop of Limeick that I "preached strange and antinomics doctrines." he statement, however, contradicts the charge; for it shows not the letter from my former Diocesan allowed the Bishop license me as a Curite in Limerick; and, moreover, the icar-General docs not himself allege this crime against me. The individual who flid so misrepresent me to the Bishop ad no opportunity of being acquainted with my doctrines; e never heard me preach, or utter any sentiment on the abject of religion; nor have he and I so much as seen each ther (except once in Church at a Visitation) for upwards of ight years. But I shall say no more on this subject, except remark, that these were precisely the charges brought gainst the Apostle Paul (See Acts xvii, 18; Rom. iii. 8; nd vi. 1, &c.

It only remains that I should notice that part of the statement, which refers to my method of preaching. The Vicar leneral says I was not "explicit" in my communication ith him, with regard to preaching from notes, or from
