The Committee being accordingly chosen, and having retired, returned with the following Address, which was unanimously agreed to.

**ADDRESS.**

My Lord,—We, the Householders and Landholders of the Deanery of Down, beg leave to offer your Lordship the expression of our high satisfaction on the occasion of your promotion from this Deanery to the See of Killaloe.

Whilst His Majesty, in this instance, has rewarded individual merit, and bestowed this mark of royal favor as the proper merit of your Lordship's deserts, His Majesty has no less consulted the honor and interests of the Church of which your Lordship is so distinguished an ornament.

For more than fourteen years, we have witnessed your zealous and unwearied labours in the efficient performance of your pastoral duties.

In the early period of your Lordship's ministry amongst us, when an infectious and alarming disease afflicted the land and, in its progress, made extensive ravages on human life, we beheld you, regardless of personal ease, and at the peril of life; visiting the sick in their abodes of wretchedness, supplying their wants, and administering the consolations of religion; your compassion for the poor, your sympathy towards the children of sorrow and suffering, and your urbanity to all, obtained for you the love and esteem of every class and denomination of men.
