Sunday night some unfeeling wretches forced open the
stable of Dr. Dungan at Castle Connell, and cut the hair off

figured the hall-door and windows of Dr. Dungan's house
with the like mixture. The outrage was evidently malicious,
and most disgraceful to its authors.

Monday last 300 of the Devitt faction armed with guns,
pistols, and scythes, marched to Newport, county Tipperary,
and drew up their forces within a quarter of a mile of the
village, where the fellows drank a keg of whiskey, and
then sent forward a reconnoitring party, who went as far as
the Police-barrack of Newport; but, having seen none of the
opposite faction, Kennedys and Murraes, they returned to
the main body without molestation, and soon after dispersed.
How long will those ruffians disgrace the country, or why
are fire-arms left in such hands?

Four men are apprehended in the county Galway, who
were sworn to murder the Rev. Mr. Sheil, P. P. of Triun,
whose brother was killed by the Terry Alts last summer.

A few nights ago, Captain Singleton, Chief Magistrate
of Police, and Lieutenant Duberly, and a party of the 64th
Regiment, at Portunna, were searching for fire arms—and
on one of the Police coming towards a farmer's house, a man
made his escape out through the thatch. He was pursued by
the Policeman, and they succeeded in arresting him when
up to his neck in a river.

On Wednesday last, Mr. Edmond Nugent, a Monk, (late
of the Sitercian Monastery, near Nantz,) was returning from
the School-house to the Friary, near Portunna, when two
men leaped over the garden wall, armed with a blunderbuss
and a pistol; the fellow who had the pistol fired it, and he
with the blunderbuss then presented it at Mr. Nugent, swore
he would blow out his brains if he would not deliver a throt-
ening notice to the Rev. Cornelius Coghlan, of the Friary,
the purport of which was to turn away the Monk from teach-
ing at the school. Captain Singleton has committed to the
County Jail the son of the former Schoolmaster, named Thos
Clarke, charged with writing the said notice, and with
bringing those ruffians to the Friary.

Laurence Marshall, Esq. of Timoline, near Doon, has
been menaced by an incendiary notice from the Tipperary
"Right Boys."

The Court Martial, Col. Worsley, Royal Artillery, Presi-
dent, which assembled at the Castle Barracks, for trial of
Colour-Sergeant Huddaway, of the 27th Regiment, and pri-
vate Collins, 97th Regiment, terminated its sittings yesterday,
but the sentence of the Court is not yet announced. The
Sergeant was charged with embezzlement of Regimental
money, and desertion, having absconded with £30 advanced
by his Captain for the company's use, and fraudulently in-
curred debts at Fermoy, where the 27th were, apparently
for account of the regiment. The Commanding Officer of
his Regiment gave the prisoner an excellent character.—
The charge against the private of the 97th Regiment was
intoxication and striking a non-commissioned officer.—
Charles Walker, Esq. Deputy Judge Advocate General,
attended the Court, and returned yesterday evening to
Dublin.

A party of the 32d Reserve, from Tralee, have arrived
in this garrison to recruit for that corps.

Major-General Sir George Bingham was expected yes-
terday at Fermoy to inspect the 9th Regiment.

Wednesday all the troops in Dublin garrison, consisting
of the 1st Dragoon Guards, Colonel Teesdale; the 10th
Royal Hussars, Captains Wallington and Osborne; the
Grenadier Guards, Colonel D'Oyley; the 28th Regiment,
Colonel Hailes; the 2d battalion 60th Rifles, Colonel Ellis;
reserve of 1st battalion of ditto, Major Leslie; 43d Light
Infantry, Colonel Booth; depot of the 23d Royal Welch
Fusiliers, Major Ross; and a large train of Artillery, paraded
the suburbs and principal streets of that city in heavy march-
ing order. The army presented a splendid appearance.—
The Marquis of Anglesey, in plain clothes, and attended by
an orderly of the 7th Hussars, rode at the head of the troops.

A General Court-Martial for the trial of an Officer, is to
assemble in Dublin, in a few days. Colonel Teesdale, 1st
Dragoon Guards, President.

The Marquess of Huntley, William Harris, and Sylvia
transported from Cork, which sailed last December with the
Service Companies and head-quarters of the 5th Regiment,
under Lieutenant-Colonel Sutherland, arrived out at Gib-
raltar on the 3d and 6th of January, after a very quick
passage. Reinforcements for the 10th Regiment, and 23d
Fusiliers, arrived out by the same conveyance.

Sir Lewis Grant arrived at Trinidad from England on the
1st of December last, and re-assumed the Governorship of
that Island, when Colonel Sir Charles F. Smith, C. B. late
Acting Governor, embarked for Barbadoes, and Captain
Gordon, Royal Regiment for England, on leave of absence.
There was a slight shock of earthquake at Trinidad, on the
4th December, which rent the walls of the barracks oc-
cupied by the Royals, besides some houses. The Royal Re-
giment had but twenty slight cases in Hospital last month.

The High Sheriff of Nottingham has conveyed his thanks
to Colonel Thackwell, 15th Hussars, and the Cavalry and
Infantry, under his command, for their services at the late
Special Commission.

DEATH OF MR. ELLIS.

The character of the late Thomas Ellis, Esq. son-in-law
of Colonel Thomas W. Mousell, of Tervoe, near this City,
is so faithfully depicted in the following passage from one
contemporary, the *Dublin Evening Mail*, that it renders any
further encomium on this worthy gentleman, wholly unne-
cessary —

"It is our painful task to announce the demise of this
most estimable and truly amiable person, which took place
at his residence in Merrion-square yesterday morning. To
few men was allotted the discharge of so many, so varied
and so important duties, and no one can deny that in each he
accomplished all that man could achieve. As a public func-
tionary he was just, impartial, and attentive, diligent in re-
search, and kind and obliging to every person who came
before him in his judicial capacity;—as a political charac-
ter, and in his station of Parliamentary Representative, he
was pure, faithful, and consistent; while as a father, a hus-
band, a landlord, and a friend—as a social companion, and
as a general philanthropist, he has left few behind him capa-
ble of filling that chasm which his lamented death has left
in society. Mr. Ellis is not more sincerely than deservedly
regretted by every member of the community, and by none
more than those who had the best opportunity of judging of
his many merits and estimating his excellent qualities."
