Limerick Quarter Sessions, INCLUDING THE CITY AND LIBERTIES. 26TH MARCH, 1832.

County of Limerick, } THE General Quarter Sessions to wit. } will be held at Rathkeale, on Monday, the 26th of March, at Ten o'Clock in the Morning, for the Division of Rathkeale, and the Civil Business will be proceeded with in the following order:—First, the Processes from the Barony of Keary; next, those from that part of Coshma which lies to the west of the Maigne; next, those from the Barony of Lower Connelloe; and lastly, those from the Barony of Upper Connelloe. On Friday, the 30th, Ejectments will be heard in the Morning; and on the same day at twelve o'Clock the Grand Jury will be sworn,—after which the Appeals will be heard, and then the Freeholders registered; and lastly, the Crown Business disposed of.
 The attention of Suitors from Upper and Lower Connelloe is particularly drawn to the change in the order in which the Baronies are placed.
 The Process-servers are desired to attend at Rathkeale on Tuesday, the 25th of March, at the Court House (which will be open for the purpose) from Ten o'Clock in the Morning till Six in the Evening, to give out their Processes. All the Processes for Rathkeale must be entered with the Clerk of the Peace, before the sitting of the Court on Monday the 26th, and he will not be permitted to receive any Processes after that time. This regulation will be strictly adhered to.
 The Quarter Sessions for the Limerick Division will commence at Limerick on Tuesday, the 3d of April, 1832, at Ten o'Clock in the Morning, on which day the Civil Business will begin, and be proceeded with in the following order:—First, the Processes from the Barony of Costlea; secondly, those from Small County; thirdly, the Processes from those parts of Coshma and Upper Connelloe, which lie to the East of the River Maigne; fourthly, the Processes from Clauwilliam; fifthly, those from Pubble Brien; sixthly, those from Oweybeg; seventhly, those from Coonagh; and lastly, the City and Liberties. On Monday, the 9th, in the Morning the Ejectments will be heard; and on the same day the Grand Jury will be sworn at 12 o'clock,—after which the Appeals will be disposed of, the Freeholders Registered, and the Crown Business then disposed of.
 The Process-servers are desired to attend at Limerick at the Court-house (which will be open for that purpose) on Monday, the 2d April, from the hour of Ten in the Morning to the hour of Six in the Afternoon, in order to give out the Processes. All Processes for Limerick must be entered with the Clerk of the Peace before the sitting of the Court on Tuesday the 3d, and he will not be permitted to receive any Processes after that time. This regulation will be strictly adhered to.
 For the convenience of Suitors at Quarter Sessions a paper will be exposed at the door of the Court-house, containing the name of the Barony, with the Civil Business of which the Court shall be then occupied. All Persons attending the Court on business are requested, upon hearing their names called, to answer by the word "Here," and they will meet with every facility in going up to the table; by neglecting to answer in this manner, witnesses and others are often obstructed by the crowd, and sometimes even by the Police. It is also requested that when the names of the parties in a Process are called, the witnesses for those parties will not wait to hear their names called but come forward at once.
 The Process-servers must be very particular in attending to their Printed Regulations, and also to the arrangements entered into by the Gentlemen who practice at the Sessions, otherwise they will be fined. The Police who shall be on duty in the Court-houses are to preserve order and silence, and on no account to be rude or rough to the Suitors, but to bring before the Assistant-Barrister all persons who misbehave themselves.
