Baron Norwood and Norbury died at his residence in Dublin on Monday, of a dropsy on the chest. The Noble Baron was eldest son of the late Earl Norbury, and his titles and estates devolve to the present Earl of Norbury, and only brother of the deceased Lord.

Mr. Sergeant Gould has been appointed to succeed the late Master Ellis, as Master in Chancery, with a salary reduced to £2,000 per annum. Mr. Perin, K. C. has been appointed third Sergeant.

The Shareholders in the Limerick and Waterford Railway have lost the grant of £45,000 from the Exchequer Loan Office, for not paying up the call made by the Directors of the Company.

William S. O'Brien, Esq. presided at a meeting, on Thursday, at Ennis, for the purpose of promoting the Ship Canal from that town to Clare, and considering the estimates of Mr. Killally for £26,000, and Mr. Grantham for 16,000. A Committee was formed, and a Memorial to the Lord Lieutenant adopted.

Youghal bridge, now open for the passage of the public, shortens the distance considerably from Waterford to Cork. A new day-coach has commenced running between Cork and Youghal.

The Ennis Mail did not arrive here yesterday evening until five o'clock: the Dublin Mail Coach awaited its arrival.

We understand that the Lord Bishop of Killaloe has appointed the Rev. Mr. McCausland to the living of Ennis, void by the death of the Rev. Michael Fitzgerald.

The Board of the House of Industry, Cork, have resolved on publishing the names of all the citizens who refused to contribute to that extensive charity.

The Steam Packet Companies engaged between Cork and Bristol, Liverpool, and Dublin, have taken a lot of Penrose's Marsh, at the Eastern point of Patrick's-quay, Cork, whereon to erect spacious stores, offices, and landing places, for the accommodation of their Packets.
