The system of allowing regimental Officers on half-pay to commute their half-pay for a sum of money is now extended to Officers of the Militia entitled to the disembodied allowances—and that allowance will not be granted to future appointments.

There are eight Staff districts now formed in England, head-quarters, Bawtry, Portsmouth, Devonport, Bristol, St. Helier, St. Peter's Port, London, and the new one at Dudley—Major-General A. Campbell is appointed to command the Inland district, station Dudley, Lieut. Campbell, 2d Light Dragoons, Aid-de-camp, and Lieut.-Colonel P. Wodehouse, h. p. Brigade-Major.

A general order has been issued to the troops serving in Ireland, prohibiting for the present the washing out of barrack-rooms, &c. as heretofore practised. The floors are in future to be kept perfectly dry, and cleaned out with a large scrubbing brush. The alarming spread of the cholera is the cause of this precautionary measure.

An Officer in the garrison of Dublin is obliged to retire from the service in consequence of not being up to his pecuniary engagements.

The intended trial by Court-Martial, in Dublin, of an Officer of the 74th Regiment, quartered at Templemore, will not take place.

Full particulars of the evidence in defence of Capt. Warrington, 3d Dragoon Guards, will be seen in fourth page, and in same page the interesting statement of Counsellor Warren at the annual meeting of the Kildare-place Society.

Thursday last, Sir Charles Dalbiac spoke at considerable length to the evidence adduced on Captain Warrington's trial, after which the Court adjourned.

Extract of a private letter:—The opinion—indeed the hope—of many is that Captain Warrington will be acquitted of all the charges. It is also now thought that if the unfortunate Colonel Brereton had lived, he too would have come off triumphant.

It has excited some surprise that Mr. Grant, the Judge-Advocate, has not himself conducted the proceedings on the two court-martials at Bristol, in person.

Bristol will in future be the head-quarters of a Regiment.

A United Service Club for the Army and Navy is about to be established in Dublin, under most flattering patronage.

Crofton Moore Vandeleur, Esq. of Kilrush, is sworn in High Sheriff of the County Clare, and Mr. Trowsdell Under Sheriff.

John Baker, of Kilcoran, Esq. is sworn in High Sheriff of Kilkenny, and M. Byrne, Esq. Sub-Sheriff.

Several Revenue trials in the Court of Exchequer, amongst them some from this district, have been postponed.

The funeral of Robert Maunsell, Esq. was attended on Monday last to St. John's Church by all the Gentry and respectability of Limerick. Upwards of fifty equipages formed in the mournful cavalcade. The solemn Service for the Dead was read by Archdeacon Maunsell, after which the remains of the venerable and lamented Gentleman were consigned to their kindred earth. Military duties unavoidably prevented Major Maunsell, 3d Dragoon Guards, and Major Maunsell, 85th, attending to pay the last rites to their departed parent, as both are in immediate command of their respective Regiments in England. The funeral arrangements made by Mr. Henry Owens, cabinet-maker, were in every respect highly creditable.

We are happy to learn that Lord Viscount Gort is in communication with the Board of Works for an advance of money to place those parts of the Tipperary and Clare Roads within the Liberties of this City in substantial repair. The public complain, with good reason, of the shamefully ruinous state of those roads, and we hope the application of this excellent Nobleman will be attended with success.

An application has been made at the Road Sessions in Ennistimon, county Clare, for a Presentment to open a line of road from Eunis to Faure fishery through Glinvane.—This would open a very desirable communication through the interior to the sea.

Friday last, one of Binnconi's travelling cars was attacked by an armed party on the road between Waterford and Dungarran, who ordered the driver to pull up, which he not obeying, they fired and wounded him. He fell from the car, and the ruffians then rifled the passengers of a large sum of money, after which they broke the vehicle in pieces. A young man, a pig-buyer, going to make purchases at the Dungarran market, was robbed of £30, and another passenger, an Englishman, was robbed of £25.

Four men escaped from Nenagh bridewell last week, charged with capital offences.

Patrick Purcell, son of a respectable farmer in the Queen's County, has absconded on suspicion of murdering James Comerford, of Ballinakill. A warrant is issued for his apprehension.

The Recorder of Cork sentenced Mary Kinnealy to 7 years transportation on Friday last, for robbery of wearing apparel. Edward Barrett and John Connell were tried and acquitted of assaulting Lieut. Charles Lee, of the 77th Regiment.

Great part of Dr. Leyne's house in Tralee was destroyed by fire on Friday night, with a quantity of valuable furniture.

Two countrymen perished by the inclemency of the weather, on the Comeragh Mountains, county Waterford, Saturday night last.

Mary Pennan, a little girl from the King's Island, was terribly burnt on Saturday evening by her clothes taking fire. She was removed to Barrington's Hospital, and received every attention, but the poor creature died on Monday evening.
