

Three additional Stipendiary Magistrates are to be appointed to the King's and Queen's Counties, and the County Kilkenny, where 500 Police are to be raised.

Thomas Lloyd, of Beechmount, Thomas Royle, of Ballinvarick, and Michael Furnell, Esqrs. are re-sworn as Magistrates of this County, by T. P. Vokes, Esq.

Major Samuel Maxwell, D. Clanchy, and A. Batwell, Esqrs. are re-sworn in Magistrates of the county Cork.

John Ireland and Charles Browne, Esqrs. are re-sworn Magistrates of the town of Galway.

Mr. Huband is not to succeed Mr. Burrowes as a Judge of the Insolvent Debtors' Court. The appointment of the Hon. Waller O'Grady is definitively settled.

The remains of the Rev. John Fitz-Gibbon, Vicar of St. John's, were interred on Thursday morning, in the Church-yard of that parish. A solemn dirge and funeral anthem were sung in the Church by the Choir of the Cathedral and St. John's. The service was read by Archdeacon Maunsell, and the Vicar-General, Dean, and all the Clergy attended in canonicals.

The Prebendary of Donoughmore, near this City, vacated by the death of the Rev. John Fitz-Gibbon, is yet open.

We are authorized to correct an article which appeared in the Chronicle of the 11th instant, and which we extracted from a Dublin Paper, namely, that there is no Church in the Parish of Emly: and to assert on the same authority, that a new and beautiful Cathedral has been erected on the old site within these six years, at the expense of £2500 out of the Ecclesiastical Funds of the Dean and Chapter without levying one shilling upon the lands, and without loan or grant from any public body.

There was a meeting of the Clergy of the Diocese of Cork and Ross at Bandon yesterday, to consider the new system of National Education.

A Privy Council was held at Dublin Castle, on Monday, when a proclamation was issued, declaring twenty townlands in the County of Kilkenny, and thirty-two townlands in the Queen's County, in a state of disturbance. The members of the Privy Council present were, the Archbishop of Cashel, Bishop of Kildare, Chief Justice of the King's Bench, Master of the Rolls, Judge of the Prerogative Court, the Attorney-General, and the Commander of the Forces.

Upwards of £1,200 reward is offered for the ruffians who attempted to assassinate Samuel Grubb, of Clogheen, Esq. including £100 from Lord Lisimore, £50 from Lord Glengall, and £100 each from S. Grubb, R. Grubb, C. Tuckey, B. Croker, and E. Taylor, Esqrs.

On the night of Thursday, an armed party, five in number, attacked a Shepherd named Joyce, residing in the Castle of Drimarsua, near Ardahan, the property of Mr. Lahiff, of Gart. They fired at him, and after lodging some slugs in his face, they knocked him down and beat him most barbarously, and struck his wife with the butt ends of their fire-arms.

It was at the request of the Magistrates in the vicinity of Listowel that a military force was ordered to that district.—There is no truth in a report of the Knight of Kerry's mansion at Ballinruddery having been burnt by the Hurlers, who were expected to enter Listowel in a large body.

The Rev. John Naughten, P.P. of Lispool, near Dingle, has positively denied that he delivered any inflammatory harangue on the subject of tythes, as stated in the Western Herald.

An unfortunate shoemaker, named John Neenan, an inhabitant of Killarney, retired to rest last Saturday night, in a state of intoxication, and in about an hour after was found dead.

A young child was burned to death on Thursday, in Ennis, by her clothes catching fire at the grate.

The gentlemen of the long robe, on the Munster Circuit, will be engaged on a very important case at Cork Assizes, arising from the circumstance of Mr. Sarsfield retaining possession of Garretstown. His right to that property is questioned by Mr. Cathbert, to whom the late H. Rochfort left £15,000 a year and a large sum in the funds.

John Mac Donnell, of Newhall, Esq. is to be foreman of the County Clare Grand Jury, who will be sworn before Judge Moore, at Ennis, on Friday next.

It is expected that the Attorney-General will conduct the crown prosecutions at Clonmel Assizes.

There are but eight prisoners for trial in the town of Limerick, while the County prison has 190.

Typhus fever rages among the prisoners in Ennis gaol, 10 of whom died of the disorder. One a Terry Alt, charged with a capital felony.

The new gaol at Trim will be completed in a few months.

The number of parishes that compounded for tythes in the diocese of Limerick is 59—for the gross sum of £16,799.—defert and Aghadone, 83 parishes—gross amount £17,440.
