

We have received the following intelligence from our Correspondent at Parsonstown:—

MURDER.—On Monday the 13th instant, it being the fair day of Berr, King's County, a man named Patrick Scully, received a blow or blows of a stick on the head, supposed to be loaded with lead or iron, from a man named Michael Conlan, which stick he had concealed under his coat for that purpose, and from the effects of which he died on the following evening. Conlan, after giving the harmless but ill-fated man this mortal blow, immediately fled out of the town. The deceased and Conlan's brother had some difference on their return from the Market of Berr to their respective homes, on Saturday the 11th instant, which was the cause of this atrocious outrage and murder, as he threatened to be revenged of Scully the fair day of Berr. Through the unremitting exertions of the Constabulary under the command of A. C. Judge, Esq. Chief Constable, (whose zeal and activity under every circumstance of emergency reflect much credit on the character of this efficient officer), Michael Conlan, charged with the commission of this murder, and David Conlan, with being accessory and the principal cause of the same, were arrested on Tuesday night, being the night after the murder was committed. Michael Conlan was apprehended in the neighbourhood of Moneygall, a distance of 15 miles from Berr, and Daniel Conlan adjacent to Kinnetty, a distance of seven miles, both of whom are fully identified and committed for trial at the ensuing Assizes of Philipstown. The deceased was a very inoffensive man, about 30 years of age, and has left a wife and family to deplore his loss.

On the same day, as John and William Cleary, brothers, were returning home from the fair of Berr, they were waylaid in Graveyard-street, by eight men, who inflicted several grievous wounds on their persons. Two of the party have been since apprehended by the Police, and fully committed for trial.

Fresh outrages have occurred in the barony of Longford, County Galway. The house of Mr. Bindon's herdsman, near Eyrecourt, was searched for fire-arms, and the inmates sworn. Several shots were fired into the house of John Mannion, a cattle jobber.

An industrious man, named Naughton, was mortally wounded by a gun-shot at Moore, county Roscommon, and a notorious fellow of the name of Leonard was taken in the same district while serving Whiteboy notices, and putting oaths to the country people.—Sunday last the house at Prospect, near Eyrecourt, was entered by an armed party who carried off two guns and a case of pistols. Many others were sworn to surrender their farms, and some severely punished for not observing a prior mandate to that effect.

A few nights back a party of miscreants attacked the house of Mr. Thomas Tracy of Bellmount, in the county of Kilkenny, and about six miles from Carlow, and seized the fire arms.

Several farm-houses were attacked by insurgents in the Queen's County last week, who served notices to quit, beat the inmates, and commanded others to put out of their employ labourers and servants obnoxious to the visitors. In three houses fire-arms were taken, and the lives of the owners threatened.

The Dublin Gazette of Saturday contains a proclamation, offering a reward of £200 for the discovery of the persons who fired at Mr Samuel Bradshaw, of Peggborough, near Tipperary, on the night of Thursday, the 9th instant; a reward of £100 for the persons who mortally wounded Simon Lundy, in an affray at Crossgar, county Down; and £100 for the murderers of James Comerford, whose body, cruelly mangled, with his throat cut from ear to ear, was found on the top of Knockardgur mountains in the Queen's County.

The country people attempted to disarm a Policeman at Fintona, on Monday, when he drew his bayonet and stabbed one of them to the heart.

On Wednesday night, a dwelling house at Glinmane, County Kerry, was maliciously burned.

Sir Edward Blakey was visiting the several military detachments in Kilkenny the last week. He has since returned to Dublin, but will again repair to that district for the Assizes.

An increase of Artillery, an additional Squadron of Dragoons, and the out-detachments of the 70th regiment will be called in and concentrated in Kilkenny; their places to be supplied by detachments of the 50th regiment. Two companies of the 52d are to be stationed at Thomastown.

Sir John Harvey, Chief Magistrate of Police, has arrived in Dublin, from Kilkenny.

Mr. O'Connell will arrive in Kilkenny on the 6th of March.

Thomas Smith, Esq. son of William Smith, Esq. of Rathcafe, C. C. Police, has been appointed Chief Constable of Police at the recommendation of Major J. Miller, and is to be stationed in Tipperary.

Mr. Tabernan, Chief Constable of Police, at Ennis, has been ordered to the county Tipperary, in the capacity of Police Magistrate. The Police force he has commanded is about to present him a piece of plate.

Edward Magan, Esq. late Paymaster of the Antrim Constabulary, is appointed a Stipendiary Magistrate for the County of Tipperary.

Mr. Ashton has resigned his situation as Constable Major of Constabulary, and has been appointed Secretary to John Villcocks, Esq. Chief Magistrate of Police, with a very handsome salary.

Mr. John McCormick, late Assessor of Taxes in the County Wexford, is appointed to be Lieutenant of Revenue Officer, and he has been ordered to proceed to Sligo and place himself under the command of Mr. Inspector General Graves, who presides over that department in the Western District. Mr. McCormick gives up his superannuation allowance of £50 a year in lieu thereof.

Mr. John Finigan, lately an Expectant of Excise, in the Waterford Collection, is promoted to a Ride in England, en route to Liverpool.

Sir Augustine Fitz-Gerald, who is elected M. P. for Limerick, was proposed by the Very Rev. Dean Staurope, and seconded by Thomas Crowe, Esq. The Hon. Baronet has filed for London to attend his Parliamentary duties.

Bradenell Plummer, Esq. of Mount Plummer, has been sworn into the Commission of the Peace for the Counties Limerick and Cork, and Major Sullivan, of Chesterfield, Magistrate of this County for the County Cork.

The Knight of Kerry, who is residing at his seat, Ballinderry, near Listowel, since vacation of office, has not ken out the Commission of the Peace for the county Kerry. Sir Edward Denny, Bart. and his brother William Denny, sq. have arrived in Tralee, from their seat in Somerset-ire, on a visit to the Rev. Anthony Denny.

William Denny, Esq. is elected a Burgess of Tralee, in ace of Major Ponsonby deceased.

Viscount De Vesci, Lieutenant of the Queen's County, a called a meeting of Magistrates this day, to consider the organised and alarming state of that County.

INSURRECTION AT JAMAICA.

The brig Lawrence, arrived at New York from Jamaica, brings a Courant of the 30th December, giving the particulars of an insurrection among the Slaves on the island. Capt. Fowler states that martial law had been proclaimed; that the slaves had burnt a number of buildings; and that Mr. Jackson an eminent barrister, of Old Harbour, had been murdered in his house by the insurgents.

Copy of a letter to a mercantile house, dated Kingston, Jamaica, 31st December, 1831:—

"I regret to have to inform you, that a most alarming revolt among the slaves in St. James's and Trelawny has taken place. Thirteen sugar estates have been burnt down, and more we fear will follow. Sir Willoughby Cotton, the Commander of the Forces, sailed yesterday morning, with troops, artillery, and rockets for the disturbed districts; and yesterday martial law was proclaimed throughout the island.

"Two companies of the 84th regiment were marched from Spanish Town to Port Henderson, and embarked on board H. M. S. Blanche, Commodore Farquhar, for Montego Bay, to assist in maintaining order and tranquillity in the parishes of St. James and Trelawny."

"Eleven o'clock at Night.—The work of destruction is going on; the whole sky, in the south-west, is illuminated. From our office we at this moment see five distinct fires—one apparently in this parish, the others in St. James's, and at no great distance from us."

On the 2d of January Captain Smith's detachment of the 22d regiment came up with a party of the rebels, and drove them in all directions, killing 30, and wounding several.—

On the 4th, a detachment from the 84th regiment also fell in with a large party, some of whom they killed, and the rest dispersed. Colonel Grignon was attacked by a considerable force of the rebels, who advanced upon the troops under his command in four columns. The soldiers returned the attack by a rapid fire, and the enemy were dispersed with the loss of 10 killed and 25 wounded, but still Col. Grignon felt it necessary to retire to Montego Bay. These discomfitures of the rebels, and the arrest of some of the leaders and others, who were immediately tried and shot, appears to have produced an impression among the slaves of the impossibility of accomplishing their object and many of them returned to their duty. Others, however, took to the interior and other commanding heights and held communication with the negroes by means of signals. The burnings were conducted by regular parties, dressed in blue jackets and black cross belts. Capt. Barnett, who advanced up the hills, addressed several of the rebels who were standing in groups, to which they replied "War! War!" The exertions, however, of the regular troops, the militia, and the maroons, had been so far crowned with success, that it was confidently anticipated the rebels would be brought to surrender.

Three Baptist preachers are in custody, and as we are satisfied they would not have been taken into custody upon slight grounds by Sir Willoughby Cotton, we hope he will award them fair and impartial justice. The three Baptist alluded to are, William Knibb, William Whiteborne, and Thomas Abbott, who had been forwarded under an escort to the head-quarters at Montego Bay, where a military tribunal was sitting. Another Baptist preacher, named William Boy, was also in custody. The deluded wretches who have been captured, and the ringleaders, who are all Baptists, declared that the missionaries have told them that they were to be free; and if their freedom was withheld at the end of the year, they must take it by force!"

We have received this day a letter from a friend at Jamaica, with newspapers and bulletins to the 6th of January, which fully confirm the above intelligence. The prompt and decisive measures of Major-General Sir Willoughby Cotton had given great confidence. Some of the most active negro incendiaries were tried by Court-Martial and shot. The Major-General had issued a proclamation, calling on the slaves to surrender, and that pardon would be granted them. Earl of Belmore, Governor-General, had also published a proclamation offering a great reward for the instigators of the insurrection, and promising pardon to all except those implicated in the destruction of life or property.—

In a second edict his Excellency proclaims Martial Law, and calls out all the Militia. A division of the 77th Regiment had arrived at Montego Bay from Kingston, to assist the Authorities. A leader of the rebels was taken by the Maroons and shot. We have noticed the capture of only one Baptist preacher. Lieut. Colonel M-Lead is appointed to command the entire Militia force of the Colony.

Cholera bills are passing through Parliament for England and Scotland; but none has been thought necessary for Ireland.

Contagion is very likely to spread from the importation of old clothes, and at this season it is hoped great care will be used in the unpacking and distribution of those articles.

It is an important announcement for the Irish distillers that 8d. per gallon has been taken off the drawback duty.

Saturday last, Lieutenant Bindon, Chief Constable of Police, aided by a single Constable, apprehended in Quin, county Clare, Thomas Gorman, charged as one of the armed party who committed a burglary at Feakle, in search of fire-arms, and wounded the owner of the house, whose name is Cooney.

The City of Limerick Jail Calendar, contains 36 names of which there are two for murder; three for sheep stealing; four for coinage; three assault and highway robbery; one for cutting and maiming with a sharp instrument, the remainder are minor offences.

Four men perished in the bay of Westport last Monday, having been upset in a canoe by a breaker.

Saturday evening, a Policeman named Darcy, while in search of a prisoner, was severely beaten near Thomond Gate, by seven or eight fellows, some of whom are in custody.

There has been a meeting of the Committee of the Auxiliary Bible Society of Cork—the Archdeacon in the chair—to express their regret at the secession of several members, and to record their attachment to the Society.

The Treasurers of the Limerick Benevolent Society have received £21 from Counsellor Anster.

Alderman Watson, Treasurer of the House of Industry and Hospital for Incurable Lunatics, Epileptics and Idiots, received yesterday, £3 for the above extensive Charities, from the Misses Ghent, of Bath, with directions that their names should be enrolled in future as annual subscribers.
