Yet, nearly ry passing day exhibits an instance of this anomaly in our itary system, which raises boys of holiday parade, after ew months nominal rank as commissioned officers, to an nerited superiority above old subalterns, several of them r twenty years standing. The principle of this system is ifestly founded upon injustice, and in practice it must ritably tend to the ruin and disgrace of that honourable fession, whose high and chivalrous character it is the deof every honest soldier to uphold. Some of those veterans suffer under the ban we have alluded to, were specially d for promotion by an illustrious Commander-in-Chief, glory of the British Army, unhappily now no more .he lived for some months more, an honourable provision ld have been secured for those Officers whose names are ed over on that list which he left as an honourable moto to his successors. We have no doubt but the country for those gallant men whose case pereinptorily calls for iry; and we earnestly hope the Authorities at the Horse rds will echo the voice of the Army and the Nation, for nothing but the voice of justice, by devising a suitable ision for Old Subalterns.
