

It is really a cruel grievance, the situation of a certain meritorious class of Subaltern Officers in the British Army, who are distinguished for years of perilous service in the cause of that Nation which has too long indeed neglected their claims by almost criminal apathy. Is it honour, justice, or gratitude, to suffer veterans distinguished in many a well-fought field, whose best blood was cheerfully expended on the burning sands of India, the frozen fields of America, and the harassing campaigns of the Peninsula, at the voice of their country, to pine now in the shade of forgetfulness,—like mere green-horns of yesterday, their juniors in professional knowledge and experience, are promoted to troops and companies over the heads of men entitled by their claims to services to the command of regiments? Yet, nearly every passing day exhibits an instance of this anomaly in our military system, which raises boys of holiday parade, after a few months nominal rank as commissioned-officers, to an unmerited superiority above old subalterns, several of them of twenty years standing. The principle of this system is manifestly founded upon injustice, and in practice it must inevitably tend to the ruin and disgrace of that honourable profession, whose high and chivalrous character it is the duty of every honest soldier to uphold. Some of those veterans who suffer under the ban we have alluded to, were specially recommended for promotion by an illustrious Commander-in-Chief, the glory of the British Army, unhappily now no more.—He lived for some months more, an honourable provision had been secured for those Officers whose names are recorded on that list which he left as an honourable motto to his successors. We have no doubt but the country is for those gallant men whose case pre-emptorily calls for redress; and we earnestly hope the Authorities at the Horse Guards will echo the voice of the Army and the Nation, for nothing but the voice of justice, by devising a suitable provision for Old Subalterns.

The following Letter, in answer to one lately received from Dublin, has been sent to the Provincial Committee for the purpose of procuring an amendment in the Statute of the Hibernian Bible Society:—(Copy.)
 I feel called upon to make one or two remarks on the subject of your communication.
