The institution is under the immediate care of three Ladies, whose time is devoted to this work of charity, and who are benevolently assisted by several young ladies of the first respectability, who alternately attend at the school to give the children of the poor all the advantages of their own acquirements. The general arrangements are under the superintendence of a Committee of Ladies and Gentlemen, to whose zeal and attention every credit is due for bringing the School to its present very forward state. Of these, the Rev. Mr. Enraght, and the Rev. Mr. Brahan, of St. Mary's parish deserve well of the poor and the public, for their untiring stewardship over the little flock they have adopted.— To repair the building and to replace forms, tables, and other articles that had gone to decay, required a heavy investment, which has been met but to meet the rent and current expenditure. The Committee will have to make the usual appeal to a benevolent Public; for this purpose the Annual Sermon will be preached at Saint Michael's Chapel on Sunday next, the 4th of March, and it is hoped that, taking the strong claims which the poor children must naturally have on the sympathies of all classes into a generous account, the Conductors of other Charities will be so considerate as to forego their claims for that day, and, if the prayers of 'these little innocents' can respond to the hallowed offering, it will be found not unprofitable to those who make it.

Clarity Sermon

THE ANNUAL CHARITY SERMON, Will be preached the 4th of March, at half-past 2 o'Clock, AT ST. MICHAEL'S CHAPEL,

By the very Rev. Dean Macnamara, IN AID OF THE CLARE NUNNERY FREE SCHOOL, THE Committee, entrusted with the direction of the School, are desirous, by the aid of the talented Preacher, to draw the attention of a benevolent Public, to the claims of an Establishment in which nearly 400 POOR FEMALE CHILDREN receive the advantages of an Industrious and Moral Education.

The necessity of an early religious education, to guard the youthful mind against the seductions of vice, is too generally recognised, and too justly appreciated, to render it necessary for the Committee to impress more urgently their anxious hopes, that a numerous audience will attend to aid them in the important labour; but they cannot avoid remarking that, in reference to the Female Poor, the necessity of early instruction is more strikingly apparent. They generally enter on life under peculiar disadvantages; in the dangers to which they are exposed, they require all the aid which religious principles can give to struggling virtue, and their perseverance in well-doing, or corruption by vice, may, in most instances, be attributed to the advantages or neglect of early instruction.

In the Clare Poor School, which is conducted on the Lancasterian System, the object proposed to be attained is, to combine an industrious with a literary education. In the former department, the Children are taught Plain Needle Work, Marking, &c. &c. while the latter embraces, on rather an extensive scale, the different branches of Reading, Writing, Arithmetic, &c. all based however on a diligent and attentive care, to instil into their young minds those religious principles which will guide their conduct through life, and fit them to become useful members of society.

That these objects have been, in a great measure attained, the Committee are disposed to think, from the flattering opinions expressed by the respectable individuals who have so frequently, since its re-establishment, visited the School, and witnessed the examination of the Children.

The Committee are pleased to have the opportunity of expressing their gratitude for the public liberality which enabled them to discharge the weighty debts which were due a short time since of the Establishment, and appeal with confidence to the oft-tried benevolence of their Fellow-Citizens, for the future support of a School, which imparts instruction to hundreds of Poor Children, who have no other means of obtaining its advantages.

Donations from those who cannot attend, will be most thankfully received and acknowledged by the Right Rev. Doctor Ryan, the Rev. Thomas Enraght, Secretary, the Clergymen of the different Churches and Chapels, William Fitzgerald, Esq. Treasurer, and Cornelius O'Brien, Esq. George-street.
