Judge Moore addressed the Jury—He was happy to perceive those Gentlemen and friends whom he had so often before met there, and whom he knew to have performed their duties as Jurors, with credit to themselves and of vast advantage to the public. The result was that this City now presents an example of peace and quietude not to be met with in any other town in this Kingdom. It reflected the highest credit on the civil authorities as well as the vast population over whom they were placed. His Lordship said he had no particular object to speak upon, and thanked them for the full attendance which the jury-box exhibited, and he had only to regret that he should have delayed them so long, but the bad state of roads between this City and Ennis, had kept him on the journey much longer than he expected.

The Court then adjourned to Monday morning.

The Arab transport has disembarked at Plymouth the head-quarters of the 82d Regiment, under Lieut.-Colonel Balfour, from the Mauritius. The Service and Reserve Companies will be concentrated at the Isle of Wight.

The 82d Regiment left seven officers and 200 men at the Mauritius, in consequence of the disturbed state of that colony.

The 81st Regiment left Portsmouth garrison in three divisions on Monday, Tuesday, and Wednesday, for the Northern district.

The 14th Regiment, at Haslar Barracks, will replace the 81st at Portsmouth.

The Scots Greys are ordered from Brighton to Birmingham, and the Queen's Buys from Leeds to Edinburgh.

The 3d Dragoon Guards are ordered from Dorchester to Brighton.

The head-quarters of the 12th Lancers moved this morning from Newbridge for Kilkenny.

Four companies of the 18th Regiment are at present quartered in the barracks of Weedon, and the remainder of the regiment is now performing quarantine, previous to their debarkation, on their return from the Ionian Isles.

Accounts from Gibraltar mention that one division of the 67th Regiment arrived from Dublin on the 7th of February; the head-quarter division of that regiment arrived on the 14th February. One division of the 94th regiment was to embark for Malta, on the 17th February, and it was expected that the head-quarter division of that regiment would embark on the 24th of February. The weather had been more severe at Gibraltar than for many years past. There was snow on the neighbouring mountains.

The City Edinburgh has arrived at Cove to convey convicts to Botany Bay. A party of the 44th, under Lieut. Stuart, accompanies as an escort.

It is currently reported in the military circles, that two Regiments of Cavalry will be sent to the West Indies.

Major Ryan, 50th Regiment, stationed in Carlow, has been appointed a Magistrate of the Counties of Kildare, Kilkenny, Carlow, and the Queen's County. This very active Officer is also a Magistrate of the Counties of Clare, Limerick, and Galway; and during the late disturbances in Clare was most active in restoring peace and good order.—At the present Assizes we perceived him among the Magistrates assisting in bringing offenders justice.

Thomas Chute, Esq. of Tralee, is gazetted to an Ensigny in the 22d Regiment, vacant by the promotion of John Vereker, jun. Esq. of this City.

The 23d Royal Welch Fusiliers wore the feck at Dublin in their caps on Thursday, St. David's day.

The Hon. Colonel Fitz-Gibbon, Lieutenant of this County, and M.P. dined with his Excellency the Lord Lieutenant at the Castle on Tuesday evening.

The Earl of Shannon, Grand Master of the Freemasons of Munster, has called a general meeting of the craft for the Assizes week in Cork, when the Officers of all the Lodges in the Province are to attend.

The Rev. R. Dickson has subscribed £11s, and W. J. Mason, Esq. £1, to the Benevolent Society who this week have distributed large quantities of Blankets.

The operation of tying the femoral artery for the disease called femoral aneurism, one of the most important in Surgery, and one showing the great importance of every facility being given to the study of practical anatomy, was performed a few days ago by Surgeon William Wilkinson, jun. in the County Infirmary with complete success, assisted by Messrs. Wilkinson, sen. Franklin, and Kane.

induced by a ball which perforated the intestines. This murder was committed in a month after Mr. Blood's murder, and in the same neighbourhood. It was nine o'clock, last night, when the Jury returned their verdict of GUILTY against the four prisoners.

Two of the above, Donnelly and Hartigan, were brought back from the hulk at Cove in company with Brody, executed for Mr. Blood's murder, as stated in the Chronicle of last month.

Thursday, John Brody, John Burke, Michael Casey and George Casey, found guilty for the murder of William Blood, Esq. of Apperale, were brought, under escort of a strong party of Police and Military, to Corofin, where they underwent the final sentence of the Law. They were quite penitent, resigned to their fate, and acknowledged the justice of their sentence. Their bodies are to be taken to Dublin for dissection, where the Hospitals are in great want of subjects.

This morning at nine o'clock a troop of the 17th Lancers left town to attend the execution of Patrick Barry at Cratloe, followed by a strong division of the 92d Highlanders. The convict was removed from Ennis gaol at seven o'clock this morning, under a strong guard of Horse and Foot, to the place of execution. Barry was attended from Ennis to Cratloe, (the place of his nativity, and the scene of his guilt) by the Rev. Mr. Fitzgerald, P. P. of Cratloe, whose admonitions prepared him for that ignominious death which he so justly merited.

At 3 o'clock this day Patrick Barry was executed within view of his own house and the site of the murder. It is a gratification to say, that he fully acknowledged the justice of his sentence, and died penitent. A great number of country people assembled to witness his awful exit. His body was taken back to Ennis for dissection in the County Infirmary. He has left a wife and four children.

The Ennis Assizes are adjourned to the 31st of March. Seventeen have been sentenced to transportation at Ennis Assizes.

A country woman who came to Ennis to prosecute a case of murder for the crown, was murdered and thrown into the river Fergus, where her body was found yesterday.

To-morrow the Mayor, Aldermen, Sheriffs, and Burgesses, of the Corporation, in regulia, will accompany the Judges to the Cathedral to attend divine service.

Presentments applied for in the County of Limerick this Assizes, 349—amount £16,475 10s. 4d. The plan and estimate to build a Bridge of three arches over the River Olohan on the road from Newmarket and Abbeyfeale to Listowel and Glin, certified last Assizes, has been approved—estimate £811.

The Assizes of Longford commenced on Monday before Judge Johnson. Lord Forbes is foreman of the Grand Jury. Judge Johnson said that long as he had known the County, he had never seen a more awful picture on its calendar.

The Assizes of Wexford commenced yesterday before Judge Foster. Lord Stopford is Foreman of the Grand Jury. Bills of indictment have been sent up against Capt. Graham and two yeomen for the Newtownharry affray.

Sir William Somerville, Bart. son of the late Member, is foreman of the County Meath Grand Jury.—Ralph Howard, Esq. M. P. is foreman of the County Wicklow, and John Ackland, Esq. of the Drogheda Grand Jury.

We have the satisfaction to announce, that on Monday night last John Quinn, alias Dreutch, who is charged with the attack on Mr. Norblad of Dromineer, near Nenagh, in July last, was arrested and is safely secured in the Nenagh Bridewell. This arrest was effected by Constable Baxter in consequence of a previous arrangement with George Finch, Esq. Major Carter, and Chief Constable Kittson. Too much praise cannot be given to Baxter for his steady and judicious conduct on the occasion.

Monday night an attempt was made to assassinate Richard Barron, Esq. of Cappin, county Wexford, while riding within a few miles of his own house. A shot was fired from behind a hedge, when several slugs and large shot lodged in his neck and throat. His wounds are dangerous.

On Thursday night, a cow-house, the property of Thomas O'Dea, parish of Killard, and barony of Ibrickane, County Clare, containing four cows, a horse, two goats, a plough, and some other things, were maliciously burned—the cattle were burned to a cinder. Other reports say that the fire was accidental.

Rev. Michael Sheahan very gratefully acknowledges the receipt of £26 towards finishing the Chapel of Mahonagh; also the charitable donation of £10, to be laid out in purchasing blankets and clothing for the poor.

The wife of Felix Hughes, an army pensioner, fell into a well at Tralee, on Thursday, and was killed.

John Hickey, who was badly hurt at a store in Denmark-street on Wednesday morning, died in Hospital the same night. Thursday the Mayor held an inquest on the body—Verdict—Death from a fracture of the head and other injuries received by him in consequence of Michael Whelan having fallen from the chain of a store in Denmark-street, upon the said John Hickey. The inquest took place at Barrington's Hospital.

A servant of Mr. Leahy, of Dublin, who robbed his master of £25, and then absconded, was taken yesterday in this City, by Mr. Vokes's Police, with £14 of the money in his possession. The information of the robbery had but arrived a few minutes when the fellow was apprehended.
