The late William Browne, Esq. whose death we announced on Saturday, was the last of the ancient family of the Brownes, in this County, and was nearly related to the famous Marshal Count Browne, who was killed at the battle of Prague; as well as to Marshal Lacy, the victorious commander of the Russians against the Turks, under the Empress Anne; and consequently to his son, the Marshal of that name, so celebrated in the military annals of Germany, during the reigns of Maria Theresa and the Emperor Joseph. Mr. Browne's ancestors derived their descent directly from Sir Hugo De Lacy, one of the principal Generals of Strongbow, and the first Lord Lieutenant of Ireland, under Henry the 2d. Like many other families, their great territorial possessions and power in this country, gradually dwindled away by civil war and confiscation. Mr. Browne received his early education in the college of Navarre, in Paris; and after his return to his native country, was Captain of a troop in the Volunteers of Ireland. His manners were those of an agreeable and accomplished Gentleman, and his social disposition rendered him the delight of every circle. He enjoyed a long and happy life in the exercise of hospitality, benevolence and charity; and the resignation and religion of his latter hours are the admiration and the solace of his surviving and lamenting friends.
