**RULES AND REGULATIONS**  
 OF THE  
**Western Yacht Club.**

1. ANY Gentleman desirous to become a Member, must be proposed by a Member of the Club. The proposer to give to the Secretary the name and residence of the Candidate, which shall be placed in a conspicuous part of the Club-Room, fourteen clear days before the ballot. One black bean in five to exclude. The ballot shall take place on the first Monday in each month, at Two o'clock, p. m. and close at four o'clock, p. m.—No admittance to take place unless Ten Members ballot. No Member to ballot, or take part in any proceedings, whose Subscriptions shall be in arrear.
- 2.—A ballot may take place every day during the continuance of the Regattas.
- 3.—Officers of his Majesty's Navy afloat, and Officers of the Army on full pay, are admissible as Honorary Members, by ballot.
- 4.—The Subscription shall become due on the 1st of January, and be paid to the Treasurer or before the second Monday in April following.
- 5.—Members are to pay One Guinea on admission, and One Guinea per annum.
- 6.—In case the Subscription of any Member shall not be paid on, or before the second Monday in April, it shall be optional with the Committee to remove the name of such Member from the Club.
- 7.—Members who have not resided in Ireland for any part of the year, are not affected by the foregoing Rules.
- 8.—The management of the Club shall be confided to a President, Commodore, Vice-Commodore, a Committee of twenty-one, a Sailing Committee of nine, and a Secretary, who will also act as Treasurer. Three to form a Quorum.
- 9.—The Committee shall produce an account of the Receipts and Expenditure of the Club on the first Monday in May.
- 10.—General Meetings may be called by the Secretary, on stating the specific purpose for which the Meeting is to be held, and fourteen clear days' notice shall be given previous to such General Meetings.
- 11.—The Committee shall meet on the first Monday in each month for the dispatch of Club business.
- 12.—No General Rule or Regulation of the Club, nor any proposition having a tendency to alter or annul any one already enacted, shall be taken into consideration, without a previous notice to that effect being given at least fourteen days previous to such meeting, specifying the nature of the proposed alteration, which, before it shall become a rule, must have the sanction of at least twenty members.
- 13.—No person shall be admissible to any part of the Club House except Members.
- 14.—No politics or gambling to be permitted.
- 15.—Yachts not belonging to the Club shall be permitted to contend for the Prizes of the Club, on such conditions as may be fixed by the Committee.
- 16.—Each Member upon his admission, will have a distinguishing private signal attached to his name, and which will also be the number of his Yacht.
- 17.—All proprietors of Yachts on joining the Club, are required to supply themselves with the necessary Signal Flags, and Code, as also the Rules and Regulations of the Club, which may be had on application to the Secretary.
- 18.—Members are required to wear the Uniform of the Club on all occasions.
- 19.—The Uniform of the Club shall be, a Dress Coat of Blue Cloth, with the Club Buttons; three buttons under the flaps of the pockets, and three buttons on the front of each cuff. Waistcoat of White Chambray, with Club Buttons, and Blue or Black Pantalons. Undress:—a Blue Jacket with standing Collar, with Club Buttons; six on each sleeve, one on each collar, and eleven on each side. Waistcoat of Blue Cloth with Club Buttons, and Blue or White. A Blue Cloth Cap with Club Band (Club Pattern).
