TO THE EDITOR OF THE LIMERICK CHRONICLE.

SIR,
 A FAIR opportunity at last presents itself of getting rid of those weighty imposts, under the Turnpike Mono- poly on the line of road between your City and Dublin. For a long time I have been using my humble efforts to accom- plish their removal; but until the present moment, with very distant prospects of success. My various Petitions to Parlia- ment on the subject so fully and unequivocally showed the injury this monopoly inflicted on the interests of the country, that the public spirit of Nenagh, Roscrea, Maryborough, Mountrath, Monastereven, Kildare, and Naas, were arrayed against it; the Grand Jurors of Kildare petitioned against it, and the Committee appointed at a meeting of the County of Dublin (the High Sheriff in the Chair) embodied the evils attendant upon the monopolising system of private interest and consequent waste of the public money, in a Petition to Parliament, where an enquiry is at last instituted under the able management of the indefatigable and patriotic member for Kildare, Mr. Moore O'Farrell. The Committee which has been appointed is composed of the most intelligent and in- dependent portion of the Irish representation; and a searching investigation and a satisfactory report may therefore with certainty be calculated on, if ample evidence is brought forward. I have myself this day received a summons to attend before the Committee, and I take the liberty of thus awaking the attention of the Public to the opportunity now afforded them of removing the grievance under which their interest has so long laboured. And I do so in the hope that such evidence as will prove the abuse will be at once furnished to "Richard More O'Farrell, Esq. M.P. Chairman of the Irish Turnpike Trust Committee, House of Commons," &c. &c.
