

The Lord Lieutenant will leave Dublin on Tuesday next for the purpose of attending the Reform Bill in Committee. It is needless to apprise our readers, that Proxies are not reckoned in Committees.

The Members for this County both paired off for the third reading of the Reform Bill.

The Rev. Mr. Moore, son of the Rev. Otwell Moore, is presented by the Rev. Thomas Quin to the perpetual Curacy of St. Patrick and Kilquane, near this City, void by the advancement of the Rev. William Maunsell to the Vicarage of St. John's.

Two hundred and fifty sat to the public dinner given Mr. O'Connell, at Cork, on Thursday evening—Mr. William Crawford, jun. in the Chair. In the course of the evening Mr. O'Connell recommended the Chairman as an eligible representative for the City of Cork.

Mr. O'Connell dines to-morrow at a public entertainment at Cashel.

Great numbers of country people mean to emigrate this season to America from this port.

The High Sheriff and most of the County Grand Jury attended a public meeting at the Wesley Chapel, Cork, on Thursday, when a petition to Parliament was agreed to, repudiating the Government plan of Education in Ireland.—Upwards of fifty Clergymen were present, and four Dissenting Ministers.

CLONMEL ASSIZES—SATURDAY.

The case of the "Hurlers," from Garranlea, in the County Tipperary, was brought on this day in the Crown Court before Judge Torrens. The Attorney General, in opening the case, made a long speech. The indictment was for appearing in arms, but there was no evidence to prove the fact.—There were forty-one persons taken; they were ordered to enter into bail to appear at the next General Quarter Sessions of the Peace, to stand their trial for a misdemeanour.

At Clonmel Assizes sentence of death was recorded against John Stapleton and John Barrett, for burglary in the house of Edmund Daniel, and against Jeremiah Lonergan, for seizing arms. Mary Breen was capitally convicted of burning the house of her master, T. Taylor, at Cashel. Thomas Fox, and John Hayes, were tried before Baron Foster and found guilty of attacking the Glebe-house of the Rev. Wm. Lee, at Mealfie, assaulting William Lacy, an old domestic, and demanding fire-arms. The witnesses for the prosecution were, Mrs. Jane Lee, her two sons, Richard and George, William Lacy, and Thomas Long. The defence was an alibi, but the Jury did not long hesitate on the verdict.

Eight men were sentenced to death at Clonmel on Monday, for burglary and conspiracy to murder.

Seventy are sentenced to transportation. The Assizes closed yesterday.

The Tipperary Police are at present allowed 6d. extra pay per diem for attending at the Assizes; one shilling was formerly the allowance.

No less than one hundred and twenty Inquests have been held in the County of Tipperary since last Assizes, in consequence of deaths occasioned by violence.

GALWAY ASSIZES.

Thursday evening Judge Burton arrived escorted by a party of mounted Police, and on Friday morning at ten o'clock, his Lordship repaired to the Town Court House, and swore in the following

His Lordship briefly addressed the Jury, and immediately afterwards proceeded to the County Court, where the following gentlemen were sworn on the

His Lordship addressed them on the state of the calendar, and the truly appalling list of offences, contained therein. He recommended particular attention to the conduct and discipline of the prisoners in the gaol, and concluded by drawing their attention to the appropriation of public money for local improvements.

The Court, in which Mr. Justice Vandeleur presides, was occupied on Friday and Saturday last with business of no great importance, namely the trial of appeal cases.—This day there were two records, one an action against an unqualified Apothecary from Gort, at the suit of the Apothecary's Hall, in which there were £18 damages and costs obtained against the defendant—and the other was an action for an illegal seizure of two cows, in which a man named Hind was plaintiff, and Pat Kirwan, Esq. defendant—verdict for the plaintiff, 6d. damages and 6d. costs.

Mr. Justice Burton presides in the Criminal Court, and was occupied on Friday and Saturday in trying several cases of sheep stealing and petty larceny, in which there were nine found guilty of these charges. Monday, four persons were arraigned on charges of aggravated Terry Altim. Sergeant O'Loughlin as conducting Counsel for the Crown in these prosecutions, addressed the Court at considerable length, after which the trial of these four individuals was proceeded upon, when the Jury returned about six o'clock with a verdict of Guilty. Sentence not yet passed. They were capitally indicted for having appeared in arms, entering the gate-house of Mark Browne, of Rockville, Esq. and others, in the neighbourhood of Athery and Cloughballymore, taking arms and administering unlawful oaths. The names of the persons convicted are Michael Kelly, John Kelly, Patrick Canane, and John Mulville. At the termination of this trial, the Court adjourned. These misguided wretches are from the neighbourhood of Kinvara, and we apprehend will forfeit their liberties, if not their lives, for the offence of which they have been found guilty.

The number of prisoners on trial at Galway County Assizes is 303.

From the unprecedented state of the county Galway calendar, and the vast number of persons for trial, it is supposed that the Assizes will not terminate before a fortnight.

At Londonderry Assizes a Process server was sentenced to a years hard labor for forging the Assistant-Barrister's name to an order on the Exchequer Office.

Baron Smith was so ill at Maryborough on Wednesday and Thursday as to be unable to attend Court.

The result of the important case of Mr. Cuthbert, tried at Cork Assizes, by which that gentleman acquires £12,000 a year, has given general satisfaction. A report will be seen in our columns. Also, a full account of the very novel and interesting speech of Mr. Perceval in the House of Commons.

Most of the indictments for murder at Cork Assizes proved to be cases of mitigated manslaughter, and more of them acquittals. In the Record of M'Donnell v. Atlas Insurance Company to recover £2,000, amount of Policy on a distillery subsequently destroyed by fire, there was a nonsuit, the premises being described in the Policy as of stone and slate, while the evidence proved there was a mixture of mud, brick, and boards. In the case of M'Gill v. Pratt, an action by a father for the seduction of his daughter, there was a verdict of £150 damages. Plaintiff was steward to Mrs. Oliver of Rockville.—defendant a man worth £300 a year in that neighbourhood.

On Saturday, and Monday, Mr. Justice Moore was engaged with the county Criminal business, but no case of

Judges Moore and Jebb will arrive here to-morrow, from Cork, and proceed next day to Ennis, where the Assizes will be resumed according to adjournment. Nine persons were taken up this week for the murder of the five Police near Lisdoonvarna, which trial will come on with other Crown prosecutions for murder, including that of Sergeant Robinson, 5th Regiment.

At Clonmel Baron Foster advised all the appellants who came before him to resort to the Quarter Sessions in preference to Manor Courts.

The Attorney-General conducts the Crown prosecutions on the Leinster Circuit—Sergeant Pennefather on the Home—and Sergeant O'Loughlin on the Connaught.

Mr. Andrew H. Lynch will offer himself to represent the town of Galway under the Reform Bill.

The Roman Catholics of Liskeery and Ardragoole, county Galway, have addressed the Rev. Thomas Lyons on his promotion to Kilmain.

At ten o'clock in the noon of Monday, eleven men attacked the house of Mr. W. Lawler, near Athy, and seized his fire-arms.

The Lord Bishop of Ossory has promoted the Rev. Francis R. Sandys to the Prebendal Church and parish of Mayne, in Kilkeny Diocese, vacant by the recent promotion of the Rev. J. B. Johnston to the parish of Tullow, in the diocese of Leighlin.

The Protestants of the Union of Ferns have presented a laudatory Address to their late Pastor the Rev. John M. Stokes, on his promotion to the Rectory of Castlebridge.

Sunday last, the Rev. John Jebb was instituted to the Prebend of Donoghmore, at the Cathedral of this City.

The Parochial Clergy of Leitrim are supplying every family in that county with copies of the Holy Scriptures gratis.

Eliza Ahern a young woman was found dead on Saturday last, in a ditch near Bruff. She had left her father's house the night before in company with her husband, who is now in custody of the Police, as the body of his wife presented several marks of violence. There was an Inquest on Sunday—Verdict, Wilful Murder against the husband.—It is remarkable that Thomas Ahern, the prisoner, now in jail, was taken up last January for violation of the above female, whose maiden name was Collins, but the friends of both parties interfered and he reluctantly married her a few days after, since which period they have seldom lived together.

Three fellows, in female attire, visited a farm in the barony of Bunratty, county Clare, on Monday afternoon, and left a notice to the Landlord not to presume to part with his Steward as intended, otherwise Lady Clare would visit him with her vengeance. This is not bad, on the eve of adjourned Assizes.

A group of armed peasantry attempted to break the pound of Tallaght on Thursday night, and rescue cattle distrained for tythes. The Police resisted and both parties fired, when one of the Police was wounded in the wrist, and one of the peasantry shot through the body. They retreated immediately bearing off their dead comrade.

Saturday last, some of the County Police, who went towards Ballingarry to serve notices of ejection on several tenants of Mr. O'Grady, were attacked by the occupants, and beaten off.

One of the ruffians who violated and then murdered a poor widow of the name of Fogarty near Thurles a few days since, was apprehended this week.

Some of the police were struck on Thursday last by the mob in Clonmel, while they were conveying witnesses out of town.

On Saturday last a poor man was robbed of some money within two miles of Clonmel, on his way home from the Assizes.

The new Malt Distillation Bill is to take effect from the 6th of April. The drawback allowance is declared to be reduced from 1s. 6d. per gallon to 1s. 2d. The Bill applies to Ireland as well as Scotland.

THE MISSIONARIES IN JAMAICA.

To the Editor of the Limerick Chronicle.

"Sir,—For the information of many readers of your paper, both in town and country, who are deeply interested in the subject, I request you will insert a few lines, condensing as much as possible the intelligence which has reached me to-day from various quarters relating to the missionaries in Jamaica.

"Messrs. Knibb, Whithorne, and Abbott, were conducted to the head-quarters at Montego-bay, on the 10th of January, by a party of the Trelawney militia, not on a charge of instigating the negroes to revolt, but because they declined doing military duty. In this they doubtless acted under the impression, that the government order of exemption for all ministers and teachers of religion continued in force. The collector of his Majesty's customs at Montego-bay applied for their release, which was granted by orders from the custos of the parish and Sir Willoughby Cotton.

"Mr. Burchell and his companions arrived on the 6th of January; but on account of the excitement then prevailing at Montego-bay, Sir Willoughby Cotton thought it prudent for him not to land immediately, but to go on board the Blanche frigate, then in the harbour. His papers had been sealed up for examination—the very step his friends could desire on his behalf, as best adapted to prove his entire innocence of the charges which have so industriously circulated against him. The 'double irons' are to be classed among the numerous inventions of the Jamaica Courtant.

"The Watchman remarks—'It is notorious that the charges brought against the missionaries are a tissue of wilful, wanton, and malicious falsehood and are intended not to hurt them only, but to injure the cause of Christianity, and to arrest the progress of religion in the island.' The Moravian missionaries are now, it seems, to be accused, as well as the Baptist and Wesleyans,—no doubt with equal justice. The friends of all may dismiss
