Reading so much, and so often of the hostile and sanguinary disposition falsely attributed to the Police, I was induced to enquire, to what extraordinary circumstance was the great forbearance of that force attributable under such unjustifiable provocation. I was answered, the Chief Constable, Mr. Brady, had been a Military Officer of great experience, and in the Police force for many years.

Sincerely deploring the wretched state of society in this part of the country, and fearfully dreading, that this late unfortunate occurrence will not tend to heal any of the causes, which have for so many years existed, I am in strict truth compelled to express my honest conviction, that nothing short of a respectable Civil force, placed under an upright, steady, and constitutional public Officer, can give peace and security to the well conditioned portion of the community.
