OF THE CHAMBER OF COMMERCE OF LIMERICK, TO J. J. TROY, ESQ.

AT a GENERAL MEETING of the CORPORATION of the CHAMBER OF COMMERCE of LIMERICK held on THURSDAY the 26th of APRIL 1832.

Esq. and Resolved—Unanimously, that the following Address to our late Collector of Customs, John J. Troy, Esq. be adopted and forwarded to him by the President on behalf of the Body, viz:—

TO JOHN JAMES TROY, Esq. Sir,—We the President, Vice-President, and Members of the Corporation of the Limerick Chamber of Commerce, be leave to address you on your removal from the Collectorship of this Port, and to express to you our sincere regret that your recent promotion (gratifying as it is on your own account) must necessarily deprive us of the services of so valuable a public officer.
