General Bourke, the New Governor of New South Wales, arrived at that colony on the 2d of December last, and was received with due honors. He was accompanied by his Lady, Mrs. Richard Bourke, and Miss Bourke. His suite consisted of Captain Westmacott, Captain Hunter, Military Secretary, the Rev. G. Innes, and Dr. Hopkinson. He was welcomed with a great demonstration of joy, and a general illumination. Addresses were presented to him by the inhabitants of Sydney and the surrounding places. The General replied very graciously, advising oblivion of all past dissensions, and expressing his desire to do everything for the benefit of the colony. Mr. McDowell has been sworn in Solicitor-General.

The Special Commission for the Queen's County will open on the 21st instant. The presiding Judges fixed upon are the Chief Justice, Judge Moore, and Baron Sir W. C. Smith. There are 140 prisoners for trial in Maryborough gaol at present.

The cottage on Ballinacally, near Paradise gate, County Clare, was set on fire on Friday night, and burned to the ground. There is little doubt that the act was malicious.

Copy of a notice which was taken down at Cullen, County Tipperary, on the 1st instant:—

"Whereas at a Vestry held at Cullen on the 24th April, the sum of £37 19s. 2d. was cessed upon the Parish and Union of Cullen. Now know all men that if the Parish of Solohead shall be demanded for such assessment, or any part thereof (in which Parish there is no Established Church, nor a resident member of said Church,) that the Parishioners will at Law defend the recovery thereof, until same shall be allowed, or enforced by an order of Court."

Sunday last the house of a man residing between Golden and Caher, was plundered of fire-arms in the absence of the inmates, who had been at a neighbouring Chapel at the time.

It having been understood that several factions intended to fight at the fair of Mountpelier yesterday, nearly 100 of the Counties of Limerick and Clare Police, together with detachments from the 12th Lancers, 27th and 92d Regiments, were drawn to this point, nine Magistrates and three Chiefs attended. The forces were disposed of round the fair, some on heights and others in the town of O'Brien's-bridge.—The business of the fair went off in perfect quiet, except for some refractory fellows who thought to raise a dust, but were soon apprehended. Just as the King's troops were being drawn off a man named Michael Sheehan struck at one of the Officers of the Lancers, this fellow had nearly paid the loss of life for his daring temerity—he is this day fully committed. The remainder of the evening passed off in quiet.

On the night of Monday, 7th inst. a party of Constabulary Police, stationed at Bunratty, in the County of Clare, under the command of Edward Mahon, Esq. Chief Constable, succeeded in apprehending Patrick Hynes, charged with the murder of John Glynn, steward to Pierce Creagh, Esq. of Dangan, in April, 1831. He has for the last twelve months escaped all the Military and Police force in said County.

The Lord Bishop of Derry has given the Rev. Mathew Clarke, Presbyterian Minister of Ardstraw, county Tyrone, £25 towards repairing his meeting house.

The Lord Bishop of Ferns has appointed his son, the Rev. Dr. Erlington, Professor in Trinity College, Chancellor of that diocese.

The Mayor and inhabitants of Wexford have resolved to present an address with a piece of plate to the Rev. Charles Strong, their late Rector on his removal from that City.

Several brass knockers have been wrenched off hall-doors in St. Michael's Parish the last few nights. The Watchmen should be on the alert to detect this species of robbery.

William Higgins for larceny of silver spoons; Robert Burke, John Connors, and Keams Walsh, for further examination—by the Magistrates at Petty Sessions, James Quin, one month's hard labor for intoxication; John Lyons same sentence, for riotous and disorderly conduct—by Thomas P. Vokes, Esq. Mary Connolly, for larceny.

SPORTING INTELLIGENCE.—On Monday last a Steeple Chase for 20 sovereigns each, over 2 miles and a half of a sporting country, took place near New Castle in this County, between Mr. Moore's, black horse Speculation, and Mr. Charles Locke's, chestnut horse, Highflyer, rode by Jockies; Speculation took the lead at starting which he maintained, closely followed by Highflyer until within a quarter of a mile of home, when Highflyer's rider having fallen, the race from thence home was won by Speculation in a canter.

Immediately after a bye-match for 50 sovereigns each over same ground took place between Mr. Morrison's bay horse, Andrew, rode by Lieut. Butler, and Mr. Pierce's bay mare, Pollyhopkins, rode by Mr. Robert Locke, when after an admirably well contested race, it was won by the former by a length.

The Clare Gold Cup was handed over to R. M. Mansergh, Esq. by that true sportsman, James Darcy, Esq. of Rockvale. Mr. M.'s Stallion, Volunteer, walked over for it on Monday, the 30th of April. The two Plates of the Gold Cup, were also presented to Mr. Mansergh, by his friend Thomas Steele, whose uncle brought the Gold Cup into the County, and kept a Pack of Buck Hounds and "a Cellar never dry."
