

The Lord Chancellor has appointed John Chapman of Bloomsfield, Esq. to the Commission of the Peace for the County of Tipperary.

The Magistrates assembled at Petit Sessions, Nenagh, have given to the Kildare-street Education Fund, £12 10s. 6d. fines inflicted by them.

In consequence of the crowded state of that prison, 54 criminals were discharged from Castlebar gaol this week, whose term of confinement did not exceed a month.

Wednesday evening, Mr. Steele arrived in this City from Clare, with a green and orange ribbon over his shoulder, and next day had a meeting in the Hay-market, near of Ellen-street. He stood on a timber platform, and addressed the crowd around him under a heavy shower of rain, uncovered, while a trades-banner floated at either side. There were about 1200 persons assembled to hear him. He thanked his brother tradesmen for their attendance at a crisis of awful importance to England and Ireland. Irishmen should be tranquil, but united and firm. He contrasted at this moment the state of both countries, one quiet and peaceable while the other was rocked to its centre by passing events, when accursed Wellington is to be forced upon the people. William the 4th had caused this dangerous crisis. He dismissed a popular Ministry and made Wellington his Premier, in contempt of the nation. The Monarch should read history, and recollect the fate of his predecessor Charles, and the ill-advised Lewis, who lost their heads on the scaffold, for despising the will of the people, not forgetting Charles Bourbon, now in exile. Mr. Steele paid an extravagant compliment to Mr. O'Connell for his services to Ireland, and described him as the Catholic Liberator. He said that a revolutionary movement at this period in England was in the highest degree probable, and he therefore enjoined the people of Ireland to be tranquil, and they would have their rights. He had read in the papers of that morning, that several of the British soldiers had become members of the Political Unions in England, and this was a mark of the strong feeling prevalent in the great mass of the people of that country. Mr. Steele said he would be in Clare next day to address his countrymen, and concluded with three cheers for O'Connell, old Ireland, Reform, and Repeal of the Union.

The Earl of Mountcashel, whose health has been very delicate for a considerable time past, is, we regret to say, suffering under an inflammatory feverish attack, which has confined him to his bed since Monday last. Nothing but ill health would have prevented this distinguished and truly constitutional Nobleman from his Parliamentary duties.

Counsellor Hitchcock took his seat on the Bench of the second division of Police, Arran-quay Office, Dublin, on Wednesday morning, and commenced the discharge of his Magisterial duties. The learned gentleman had been sworn in the day preceding before the Magistrates of the Head Police Office.

The Right Hon. Thomas Spring Rice has subscribed £10 towards the building and repairs of Castle-Connell Chapel, by the hands of Thomas Devitt, Esq.
