

Houses, was read from the Altars of the Roman Catholic Chapels in this City on Sunday last:—
Park-House, May 19, 1832.

REV. DEAR SIR,

Having consulted several Medical Practitioners of eminence, and other Gentlemen of sound discretion, all deeply interested in the welfare and safety of the inhabitants of this City, with regard to the propriety and necessity of abridging the time of Divine Service on Sundays and Holydays in Chapels, where crowded congregations usually assemble; and it having been their unanimous opinion, that at so alarming a moment, when the existence of Cholera is generally apprehended, a regulation to that effect would be very advisable, I request you will inform the Clergy under your superintendance, and give public notice also to the parishioners that Sermons, Homilies, Exhortations, and Vespers, are hereby prohibited, till such time as notice shall be given to the contrary. It is in like manner recommended to administer the Holy Communion to the faithful after Mass only, in order to shorten thereby the period of attendance on the part of the congregation in general. Under the present circumstances, Benedictions of the Holy Sacrament may be dispensed with, and when it may be deemed necessary to make public communications from the Altar they should be as brief as possibly convenient. The necessity, which imposes the obligation of suspending for a time public duties of such paramount importance, demands a proportionate increase of zeal and assiduity on the part of the Clergy in the private inculcation of religious and moral instruction. I trust it will not be considered that these precautions are adopted with any view to the security of the Clergy; such an unworthy imputation would have no foundation in fact. The Clergy do not fear for themselves, their alarms are excited by the dangers impending over the flocks to whom they have been appointed pastors. The certainty of their determination of fearlessly clinging to the people in the hour of peril and danger (the effect of a firm persuasion that the gates of God's mercies are never closed against the returning sinner) is so fully established by the edifying conduct of their brethren in the ministry of Dublin and Cork, that I feel it unnecessary to give any further assurance to the people of Limerick, that in like circumstances they may assuredly expect similar conduct from their own Clergy.— Thus much, however, I deem it right to declare, that, in my opinion, any Clergyman in such an awful emergency, as the present moment threatens, who would abandon his flock, would be no more than a mere "hireling," and that serious doubts may be justly entertained of the soundness of his faith.

I beg leave also to call your immediate and practical attention to the following recommendations selected from a Circular, which I have a few days ago received from the Secretary of the "Central Board of Health for Ireland," viz.

"1. That full ventilation of all places of Public Worship should be adopted, by keeping the windows and doors freely open, on every practicable occasion, between the hours of ten in the morning and four in the afternoon.

"2. That in all such places frequented by the lower class of people, more than ordinary exertion in washing and cleansing should be employed; care being taken that the floors, seats, or pews are dry, when the Congregation is admitted to them.

"3. That during each day, Chlorine Gas be diffused thro' every part of the building, according to the mode which experience has proved to be most efficacious."

In the firm and consoling hope, that, with the assistance of Divine Grace, you and all our other Rev. Brethren will be enabled to surmount every danger and difficulty in the discharge of your spiritual functions, and that by your zealous ministry you will co-operate with God's merciful Providence in converting this scourge of his wrath into an instrument of conversion and salvation. The Board of Health at Tralee have officially announced that malignant Cholera rages in that town since the 13th inst.

Total number of deaths reported from Galway 20, cases 44.

Cholera has appeared in Ballinasloe with increase of malignity, and in 5 new cases there are 3 deaths. Total cases 37—Total deaths 12.

Cholera in Cork last Saturday, 33 new cases, 4 deaths, 57 recoveries. Sunday, 32 new cases, 4 deaths, 30 recoveries—and Monday, 32 new cases, 6 deaths, 57 recoveries, remaining 22 cases. Total deaths in Cork 450—2,041 cases.—Total cases at Kinsale 93, deaths 16.—Fermoy is free from the malady, and Cove perfectly so. Cholera is on the decline in Buttevant. Ninety-six Prostitutes died of Cholera in Cork.

The deaths in Cork yesterday were 6—New cases 35—Recovered 30. In Kinsale the Cholera is progressing, also in Bandon.

The Cholera in Cork is now almost quite divested of malignant symptoms. The last six deaths on Monday, the Mayor of that City says, were caused by whiskey drinking.

The Netherlands Government has ordered that the several places on the Coast between Dublin and Cork, and also Belfast, shall be considered under the class of suspected places, and consequently that vessels from thence arriving in the ports of Holland, will have to perform a Quarantine of seven days.
