These directions will, of course, prove equally beneficial in hospitals, work-houses, prisons, ships, and the habitations of the poor, where numbers are confined in a small space; ventilation and cleanliness being also strictly observed, and the powder mixed in equal quantities with whitening, to wash the walls. If death takes place, the body will be preserved from corruption for a considerable time, if well washed and occasionally sprinkled with the liquid and two pounds of the Powder should be put into the coffin with the body.
