At an highly respectable Meeting of the CITIZENS of LIMERICK, convened this day at the Commercial Buildings, pursuant to Requisition from the MAYOR—the following Resolutions were proposed and unanimously adopted, the Right Worshipful and Hon. JOHN P. VEREKER, Mayor, in the Chair:—

Proposed by Captain Garrett Hugh Fitzgerald, and carried by acclamation.

Resolved—That the present state of the City, awfully and fatally visited as it is by the Cholera, calls upon us for prompt, united, and effectual measures to arrest the ravages that this disease is making around us.

Proposed by Samuel Dickson, Esq. seconded by William Roche, Esq.

Resolved—That it appears to the Meeting that this object would be most effectually attained, if in addition to the assistance afforded by the Board of Health, means were adopted to supply with wholesome food and other necessaries the destitute poor, and those discharged from the Hospitals.

Proposed by the Right Rev. Dr. Ryan:—

Resolved—That a Fund be raised at once by voluntary subscription for this purpose, and that application be made to all persons connected with this City and District, for their contributions thereto.

Proposed by Arthur Evans, Esq. and seconded by Francis John O'Neill, Esq.:

Resolved—That Soup Kitchens be established, and that Potatoes and other necessaries be distributed to the Poor.

Proposed by Francis Philip Russell, Esq. and seconded by John Kelly, Esq.

Resolved—That a Committee to carry the above Resolutions into effect be appointed, consisting of twenty-one, together with the Right Worshipful the Mayor and the Members of the Board of Health, the Officers of Health of all the Parishes, and the Clergymen of all persuasions in the City. 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TITHE MEETING.

At a Meeting of the Parishioners of Donoughmore, the South Liberties of the City of Limerick, at the Parish Chapel, on Sunday the 27th instant, the following resolutions were unanimously adopted:—

Proposed by Mr. James O'Kelly, and seconded by Timothy O'Kelly.

Resolved—That the Rev. Mr. Tuohy be requested as Chairman, and Mr. J. Callinane as Secretary to this meeting.

Proposed by Mr. David O'Neill, and seconded by Robert O'Shaughnessy.

Resolved—That we consider the Tithe impost in itself, and as it is, to be an oppressive and unjust in principle, and oppressive in practice; it is, upon the people of one creed to support the rights of another; and that its exaction and collection tends to destroy the ties of love and friendship, that bound the people together, and that nothing but its total abolition will tend to give peace and security to this kingdom.

Proposed by Mr. Edmond Fitzgerald and seconded by Thomas Welsh.

Resolved—That we enter our protest against the Church Rates; determined as we are, to oppose their collection in every legal and constitutional shape, and that we resolved to quietly submit to any sacrifice of property rather than encourage their continuance; therefore, we will not purchase any chattles distrained for tithes, as an enemy, whom we will not support, and our daughters, shall shun as if he were with that fatal malady, the Cholera Morbus.

Proposed by Mr. John O'Brien and seconded by John Rahilly.

Resolved—That we petition both Houses of Parliament for a total abolition of Tithes and Church Rates, and that a petition now read be adopted by this meeting. The names to be forwarded for presentation to the Earl of Ebury, in the Lords, and Daniel O'Connell, Esq. in the Commons; and that Lord King, and Henry Grattan be requested to support their prayer in their respective Houses.

Proposed by Mr. P. Meehan, and seconded by John Meehan.

Resolved—That our special thanks are due and given to that uncompromising patriot, Daniel O'Connell, to whose untiring exertions, indomitable perseverance, and untiring virtue and patriotism, we are indebted for the abolition of Tithes and Church Rates.
