Captain Rickard O'Connell, of the Kerry Militia, died on Sunday, at Tralee, of cholera—where 45 deaths have occurred altogether.

The Trappists have taken possession of their new establishment on the estate of Sir Richard Keane, in the county Waterford. It is designated new Mount Mellera.

That very desirable work the Tralee and Blennerville ship canal will be commenced next week.

The inhabitants of Tralee are to meet on the 15th instant, to consider of the lighting, cleansing and watching of that town.

The total receipts of the Harbour Commissioners of Cork, last year, were £8,179, and the expenditure £7,820. The harbour duties of Cork are now reduced one-half.

Mathias Headley, of Mount-Rivers, Esq. is appointed a Magistrate for the county Cork.

The last number of the Athenæum, a Journal of Literature, Science, and the Fine Arts, contains a highly complimentary eulogium on the exquisite vocal talents and musical taste of Miss E. J. W. Owens, Officer of Health St. Michael's, thankfully acknowledges the receipt of two loads of straw from G. H. FitzGerald, Esq. and Joseph Jones, Esq. for the use of the Cholera Hospital.

### DEATHS.

Of paralysis, at Richmond-place, yesterday morning, John Boyle, of the city of Cork, Esq. who had been on sojourn here for the last month, and intended to return on last Saturday,—but, from motives of curiosity, or, as he himself observed, "to see what materials Limerick possessed for a public meeting," remained to witness the one which was that day held at the Commercial-Buildings,—where, prompted by the lively impulse of a quick sensibility, he participated in the proceedings, and, in the cause of the poor, made his last public display with all that point and eloquence for which he was so long distinguished among his fellow citizens. As an advocate for popular rights, and a strenuous supporter of the humbler classes of the people, Mr. Boyle was very conspicuous in his native City. In public his manner was manly and commanding, and, when opposed, often impetuous and impassioned: in private and among persons with whom he had no intimacy, his modesty amounted almost to diffidence; but, in the society of his friends and acquaintances, he was peculiarly pleasing, and will be long remembered for his social virtues. At one period of his life he was on the career to fame and fortune, both of which he might have attained had he directed his talents to the profession for which he was eminently qualified; but, having served all his Irish Terms as a Law Student, he unfortunately became involved in a suit with two County Cork Magistrates for a letter addressed by him to Lord Chancellor Manners relative to some imputed Magisterial delinquency, and subsequently abandoned his intention of becoming a Barrister. That well-conducted Provincial Paper, *The Southern Reporter*, was first established by Mr. B.; but, it having passed into other hands, he became the Proprietor of that bold, caustic, and amusing Provincial, *The Freeholder*. Our sketch of this lamented Gentleman's character is necessarily scanty; but the Cork Press, with which he was so long associated, will no doubt do ample justice to his memory and merits. At his own request, Mr. Boyle's remains were interred in St. John's Church-yard at an early hour this morning.
