

Captain Vandeleur's troop of the 12th Royal Lancers have got the route this day to join head-quarters at Ballincollig, near Cork, to be replaced by the Enniskillen Dragoons. It will be a singular coincidence to see this garrison then composed of the two distinguished Enniskillen Regiments—6th Dragoons and 27th Infantry, who both shared in the glories of Waterloo.

There was an Anti-Typhoid meeting at Loughmore, on Thursday, the Parish Priest in the chair. Proceedings in our next.

On Wednesday the Special Commission for the Queen's County was adjourned by Chief Justice Bushe, and Baron Smith to Thursday the 21st inst. after eight were sentenced for death, 15 for transportation, and 15 for imprisonment—There was but one acquittal at this Commission which sat from the 23rd of May to the 6th of June, and while so employed 50 outrages were committed in the county.

A meeting of the Trades of Waterford was held on Thursday last, to concert measures for the encouragement of Irish Manufactures. The Rev. Mr. Clarke, a Dissenting Clergyman, appeared in a dress of coarse gray cloth, which, he said, was of Irish Manufacture, and which he commenced wearing with the hope of stimulating others to follow his example.

A typhoid seizure made near Ardferd, County Kerry, by Mr. Rice, on Monday last, was rescued by the peasantry who collected in great force, and beat Mr. Rice and the drivers.

The system of passive resistance to Typhoid has been introduced at Athenry, County Galway, and acted upon.

Thomas Whitestone, Esq. is unanimously elected Coroner of the county Clare.

John Coghlan, of Kilcoy House, Esq. has been appointed a Magistrate of the county Waterford.

Lord Clements is building an extensive mansion at Renn, near Mohill, under the guidance of Mr. Murray, Architect to the Board of Works.

This day the Royal Cork Yacht Club, will elect committee and officers for the current year.

The late Archdeacon Trail has left £50 to the parishes of Lisburn, and £50 to the parish of Billy.

Only four Freeholders have served notice of Registry for Bruff Sessions the 28th inst.

Pigs averaged 36s. per cwt. at the fair of Clonmel on Tuesday.

On Monday last the Treasury directed the advance of £17,000 for the improvement of the Docks and Quays at Galway.

John Johnstone and Thomas Fitzmaurice, sentenced at last April Sessions to seven year's transportation for stealing butter, have been re-transmitted from the hulk, at Cove, to our County Jail.

Two hundred Whitefeet entered the town of Ross on Monday, and attacked the houses of some of the most respectable inhabitants.

The 25th inst. is appointed for the election at Nenagh, of a Collector of the barony cess of Slievardagh, in place of the late Thomas Lane Baker, Esq.

The Officers of Health, St. Mary's, thankfully have received five gallons of Vinegar from Mr. John Broden, Mary-street.

The Board of Health have received from Mr. O'Flaherty of Croon and D. O'Brien, Esq. of Cratloe, an acceptable gift of two loads of straw for the Hospitals.

The Officers of Health of St. Mary's parish, have to thank those Gentlemen who have so kindly sent supplies of Straw and Hay for the use of the poor cholera patients, particularly John Croker, Esq. of Ballynagard, whose donation of fresh straw was well covered from the wet. It is hoped that such Gentlemen as have not yet contributed, will see the necessity of doing so, and their carriers will only have to deliver it at a Store House, appointed under the care of Nicholas Kelly, at James Lysaght's, No. 1, Merchant's-quay.

The Relief Committee have received a load of straw from John Waller O'Grady, Esq., also, one load each from Capt. Kane, John Croker, Jonas Morris, and Mr. M'Keon, which were sent to St. Mary's Hospital, where it was much wanted.

On Thursday last, at his seat, Milltown-House, in the county of Clare, in his 80th year, Thomas Morony, Esq. An enumeration of the various estimable qualities which endeared this gentleman to his family and friends, as well as to society at large, would be superfluous to those who knew him, while to those who did not, it might appear exaggeration. Mr. Morony was, we believe, the senior Magistrate and Grand Juror of his county, the duties of which offices he discharged with honor and credit to himself, and to the advantage of the public. The chief exertions of his long and active life were turned to the improvement of the country where his property lay, and on which he always resided; that these exertions have been attended with eminent success, the prosperous appearance of that country bears evident testimony, brought to its present flourishing condition, from a state of nature in which he found it.—Cheered to the close of his life by the consolations of religion, he departed joyfully, relying firmly upon the efficacy of the Atonement, and in the hope of future Salvation.

At his house in Merrion-Square, Dublin, Anne, the wife of Robert Maunsell, Esq. and niece to Thomas Lloyd, Esq. the late Member for this County. This highly respectable female was a bright example of the domestic and social virtues. In private life she discharged the amiable duties of Parent, Wife, and Mother, with signal success, and her numerous friends will long deplore the death of one who was an ornament to the family circle, and a valuable member of society.

On Saturday, in Tipperary, in the prime of life, James O'Brien Scully, Esq. eldest son of Edmond Scully, Henry-street, greatly regretted by his numerous friends;—he bore a long and most painful illness with true Christian resignation. His amiable and benevolent disposition, and active philanthropy gained him the good will and esteem of all who had the pleasure of his acquaintance. He was interred in the family burial place, the Rock of Cashel.—The number of the gentry and people of the town and country which accompanied his remains to the grave, is the best testimony of the respect in which he was held, and speaks more for him than any panegyric.

At her residence, on Ham Common, England, in consequence of her clothes catching fire, Mrs. Budworth Palmer, the benevolent Lady who subscribed £4,000 to the Irish poor last year. Every article of furniture in the room was burned to a cinder, and with difficulty was the house preserved. By her death, Sir Win.
