Sunday evening, about 5 o'clock, a melancholy accident took place on the river between Mousell's creek and Ballinacurra creek, an open sail-boat, in which a small party were embarked, having upset thro' some mismanagement. Unhappily three persons perished on this fatal occasion, a fine boy, son of Mr. Parris, Veterinary Surgeon, a servant boy, and a lad of the name of Harrison. We are authorised by Mr. Parris, and the survivors, to state that it was only by the very prompt and humane exertions of Francis P. Russell, Esq. and his crew, under Divine Providence, they were saved from the watery grave which overwhelmed their unfortunate companions. Mr. Russell's pleasure yacht, the Mary Anne, was, at the time of the fatal occurrence, nearly a mile distant, and were it not for his superior nautical skill, combined with great presence of mind, and the coolness with which he ordered his men, all would have been lost. Four were saved, and they have expressed the most grateful acknowledgments to Mr. Russell for his successful and unparalleled exertions in their behalf.

Three young men were drowned in the act of bathing near Croom, last Sunday.

Monday morning three of the crew of the James Morgan merchant vessel, were drowned by the upset of a small boat near the North Wall, Cork, while raising the ship's anchor.

The examinations for the two vacant Fellowships in the University of Dublin, commenced this day, and terminate on Friday.

The Lord Bishop of Meath has been pleased to collate the Rev. Henry Daniel to the united living of Porlemon and Pordnas Tangan, in the Diocese of Meath; and the Rev. John Reed, to the Rectory and Vicarage of Kilbride Pilate and Enniscoffey, in the same Diocese.

A tythe sale was appointed at Freshford, county Kilkenny, last Saturday, when 500 of the 70th Regiment, under Col. Evans, and a strong Police force, under Colonel Osborne, were present, and some thousands of country people, with several Roman Catholic Clergymen and Magistrates. The cattle were in pound, but the keeper refused to give them up to the bailiff for sale, and the whole assembly then dispersed, midst loud shouts of exultation from the country people.—The tythes were due to the Rev. Mr. Cumming.

The most inflammatory placards in large type against the payment of tythes, and the purchase of any stock at sale under tythe seizure were posted the last few days in Doneraile, Buttevant, and all the surrounding towns and parishes. Numerous meetings took place in Doneraile, and Buttevant. To the latter town a large party marched from Charleville, preceded by music, hurraing, and carrying green boughs, also a white flag with the inscription "William the 4th, no tythes, union and firmness."

Friday last, a bullock, seized for tythes due the Rev. Mr. Robinson, was sold by public auction opposite the pound of Tallaght, for 8s. 6d.

The Auction advertised at Springfield, near Ennis, will not take place.
