

We received the following from a Correspondent, dated Drogheda, yesterday:—"The natural consequences of a Regiment being sent into a City where the Cholera rages, with fearful malignancy, have already shewn themselves in a most awful manner. Sunday morning, about five o'clock, Sergeant Cunningham, of the 99th Reserve, was seized with Spasmodic Cholera, and notwithstanding prompt and immediate aid, he died before four o'clock in the evening. Yesterday, Sergeant Andrews, of the 99th, was also attacked with Cholera so violently as to require two men to draw down his legs, but the last accounts were rather favorable. Sergeant Cunningham was an old and much esteemed non-commissioned officer, every mark of respect, consistent with prudence, was paid him. The flag on the Tower hoisted half mast high, three volleys were fired from the platform, and at the last volley the flag was lowered altogether."

We understand that Mr. William Clarke, of George's-street, has successfully treated the following persons who were attacked with the malignant cholera, according to the plan recommended by Doctor Mahon:—Kitty Riely, Roche's-street, John Burns, George's-street, James Dinan, Creagh-lane, Mary Hinchy, Henry-street, and Jerry Gorman, Palmerstown.

The Post-Office establishment is now fixed at the Custom-House—a very central depot between the New and Old Towns, where it must be great convenience to the public to be permanently situated. We hope ere long to see Customs, Excise, and Stamps all concentrated in the same establishment, for which there appears free accommodation.

The following persons from the Stamp Office have been superannuated at such retired allowances as their length of service entitled them to—Inspectors Browne, Darcey, Campbell, and Bates, together with Mr. Armstrong, Receiver General, and Messrs. Stanley, Marland, Frank, and Hare. The Stamp Board are about to consolidate the distribution of Counties, that Clare and Nenagh district is to be added to Limerick, making Limerick the Head Office.

Sunday evening, about 5 o'clock, a melancholy accident took place on the river between Monnell's creek and Ballinacurra creek, an open sail-boat, in which a small party were embarked, having upset thro' some mismanagement. Unhappily three persons perished on this fatal occasion, a fine boy, son of Mr. Parris, Veterinary Surgeon, a servant boy, and a lad of the name of Harrison. We are authorised by Mr. Parris, and the survivors, to state that it was only by the very prompt and humane exertions of Francis P. Russell, Esq. and his crew, under Divine Providence, they were saved from the watery grave which overwhelmed their unfortunate companions. Mr. Russell's pleasure yacht, the Mary Anne, was at the time of the fatal occurrence, nearly a mile distant, and were it not for his superior nautical skill, combined with great presence of mind, and the coolness with which he ordered his men, all would have been lost. Four were saved, and they have expressed the most grateful acknowledgments to Mr. Russell for his successful and unparalleled exertions in their behalf.

Three young men were drowned in the act of bathing near Croon, last Sunday.

Monday morning three of the crew of the James Morgan merchant vessel, were drowned by the upset of a small boat near the North Wall, Cork, while raising the ship's anchor.

The examinations for the two vacant Fellowships in the University of Dublin, commenced this day, and terminate on Friday.

The Lord Bishop of Meath has been pleased to collate the Rev. Henry Daniel to the united living of Portlemon and Pordnas Tangan, in the Diocese of Meath; and the Rev. John Reed, to the Rectory and Vicarage of Kilbride Pilate and Enniscoffey, in the same Diocese.

On Monday night, Mr. Bean's Corn-store at Carrick-on-Suir, was robbed of a quantity of Oats.

On Tuesday night, a Cow was shot near Mona, County Tipperary, belonging to a man of the name of Dooley. Same night, a Mule was killed on the lands of Killoony, near Thurles.

The Protestants of Roscrea, with the Hon. Francis A. Prittie, have addressed the Rev. Mr. Higgins on the organised hostility to the payment of tithes at this crisis, and declaring they will pay forthwith all claims upon them for tithes due to him.

A tithes sale was appointed at Freshford, county Kilkenny, last Saturday, when 500 of the 70th Regiment, under Col. Evans, and a strong Police force, under Colonel Osborne, were present, and some thousands of country people, with several Roman Catholic Clergymen and Magistrates. The cattle were in pound, but the keeper refused to give them up to the bailiff for sale, and the whole assembly then dispersed, amidst loud shouts of exultation from the country people. The tithes were due to the Rev. Mr. Cumming.

The most inflammatory placards in large type against the payment of tithes, and the purchase of any stock at sale under tithes seizure were posted the last few days in Doneraile, Buttevant, and all the surrounding towns and parishes. Numerous meetings took place in Doneraile, and Buttevant. To the latter town a large party marched from Charleville, preceded by music, hurraing, and carrying green boughs, also a white flag with the inscription "William the 4th, no tithes, union and firmness."

Friday last, a bullock, seized for tithes due the Rev. Mr. Robinson, was sold by public auction opposite the pound of Tallaght, for 8s. 6d.

The Auction advertised at Springfield, near Ennis, will not take place.

The Inland Steam Navigation Company have declared a dividend of 5 per cent.

A regular Wagon for the conveyance of goods and passengers between Galway and Dublin is about being speedily established.

The Waterford House of Industry is crowded with lunatics and idiots.

The great wool fair of Ballinasloe will be held on the 6th of next month.

Four £50 freeholds, one £20, and one £10 have given notice of registry at Kildare Sessions, the 28th inst.

Penny Posts are now established in the following places in the County Galway: Outerard, Clifden, Craughwell, and Monivea.

Lahinch is filling fast, and the principal Lodges are nearly all occupied, the Mail Car passing through twice a day is of infinite service to this and the other Watering places on the Western Coast—Lahinch is known to be a superior sea bathing resort.

Thursday evening, a wager of 20 guineas was made at a military party in Dublin, between two Officers, to walk forty miles in ten hours. The match came on next morning in the Phoenix Park, when Captain Goldie, 66th Regiment, and Lieutenant Williams, 21st Fusiliers, Aid-de-Camp to the Lord Lieutenant, started before a great multitude of all classes of people. Lieutenant Williams gave in by advice of his friends after traversing 26 miles, and Capt. Goldie accomplished the task amid the acclamations of all present in one hour and three minutes less than the stipulated time.

On Sunday an Inquest was held by Thomas Whitstone, Esq. Coroner, on the body of Thos. M'Mahon, of Freagh, county Clare, who came by his death in consequence of a beating he received from a bull. Verdict accordingly—This man was so well liked by the people that they stoned the bull to death.
