On their arrival ion the 8th and 9th Instant, they availed themselves of their .exclusive right to beat their drums, &c. through the Highstreet, pass the Cross, Old Parliament house, &c. which was granted to them when raised for the defence of the city by the Earl of Leven, in the year 1698. They bear the Arms of the City (the Castle) on their Colours and Appointments.
